**Heart Balm Held Legal Extortion,  
Mrs. Nicholson's Bill Would End Evil**

WOMEN, having achieved a  
basis of social, political and  
economic equality with men, will  
lose rights of filing court actions  
for heart balm, if a bill in-  
troduced today in the House of  
Representatives by Indiana's only  
woman legislator becomes a law.

Branding most suits for breach  
of promise, alienation of affec-  
tions and seduction as attempts  
at legal extortion, Mrs. Roberta  
West Nicholson (D., Indianapolis)  
sponsored a measure which would  
prevent the filing of such suits  
in the state.

Violation of the law would call  
for a fine of not less than \$100 nor  
more than \$1000 to which might be  
added imprisonment for a  
term of not less than one year  
nor more than five years, in the  
discretion of the court.

The bill also would make it  
unlawful for any person, either as  
litigant or attorney, to name or  
describe any co-respondent or  
participant in misconduct in any  
action for divorce, separate main-  
tenance, annulment of marriage,  
or custody or care of children, ex-  
cept upon direct order of a compet-  
ent court.

MRS. NICHOLSON, prominent  
as a leader in Indiana legis-  
lation to establish woman's  
equality, believes the rights now  
available to both men and women  
to recover damages for breach of  
promise and alienation of affec-  
tions should be abolished as relics  
of the Stone Age theory that  
women were mere chattels.

"I believe I am correct in de-  
claring that while both men and  
women may sue for breach of  
promise," Mrs. Nicholson declared  
as she scanned a copy of her bill,  
"that women, almost exclusively,  
avail themselves of such right of  
action. This is contradictory to our  
theories of equality."

"No self-respecting woman,"  
Mrs. Nicholson continued, "would  
start a proceeding of the sort per-  
mitted under our laws. In fact  
it is the self-respecting woman  
who falls victim of a designing,  
scheming stenographer or office  
assistant. In such a case, the man  
usually pays to keep the charges  
off of court. If he failed to do so  
the publicity would ruin his  
career. His self-respecting wife  
would sue because of the extor-  
tion."

"I am firmly convinced that  
most of the actions for breach of  
promise and seduction have ex-  
tortion as their motive. This I  
see to prevent through the  
adoption of this bill."

THE naming of co-respondents  
in divorce cases also may be  
used as a means of extortion, Mrs.  
Nicholson believes.

Rarely does a man sue for  
breach of promise, Mrs. Nicholson  
pointed out.

"How," she asked, "does it in-  
jure a woman if a man backs out  
of an engagement to marry?"

"Surely a suit to recover money

shall be brought within 60 days  
after the breach occurs, the measure  
provides.

Contracts in payment of any  
prohibited action are declared to be  
contrary to public policy and void.
