

BOARD URGES 2 MORE YEARS OF GROSS TAX

Radical Changes Opposed
in Report Submitted
to Governor.

Recommendations that the present gross income tax be continued another two years were made in the formal report of the special tax study commission, announced yesterday.

The committee, made up of business, labor and professional men, has studied the tax system in the state for several months, and it went on record as being opposed to any radical change in the present state taxing system.

The report, filed with Gov. Paul V. McNutt, was made on the theory that no additional tax revenue would be needed, William H. Arnett, committee chairman, explained.

Mr. Arnett said that if it was found necessary to raise more money to match Federal funds for social and relief programs, the study commission would be glad to offer suggestions on new taxation.

The committee made several specific recommendations for changes in the law exempting property from taxation. These changes provided that schools operating for profit and college fraternities and sorority houses, now exempt, would be taxed.

Income-producing property held by a trustee for municipal, educational, literary, scientific, religious and charitable purposes would be removed from exemption, and the money and personal property so held, when used for private profit, would be taxed.

The committee wanted the law revised on exempting church property to include the building, "or part thereof" used "exclusively for religious worship." Exemption for privately owned cemeteries would extend only to their perpetual care fund.

The report also contained the recommendation that no property be sold for delinquent taxes until 1938. It approved in principle a bill to license itinerant merchants, and it favored imposing an excise tax on Federal building and loan associations to place them on a parity with state building and loan organizations.

CITY TRUCKMAN DIES IN RAILROAD CRASH

Heavy Vehicle Takes Fire in Mishap at Washington, Pa.

Eliza Dillard, 1356 Kealing-av., was killed yesterday at Washington, Pa., when a switch engine crashed into a five-ton truck he was driving for the John J. Madden Manufacturing Co., 1600 N. Sherman-dr., according to word received today by the Madden firm.

Mr. Dillard was caught in the cab of the truck and died before members of the crew could reach him. The truck and its entire cargo, household goods in transit, were destroyed by fire.

Mr. Dillard, 34, is survived by his widow and a son, Webster Dillard.

BANDIT SUSPECT DRAWS 'HIDDEN' GUN ON POLICE

Prisoner Is Beaten Into
Submission; Episode Is
Second for Day.

Prisoners were searched with more diligence by police today after Brick Graddy, 28, alleged bandit, attempted to draw a revolver on Sgt. Fred Hague, en route to police headquarters last night.

Graddy, the second person yesterday to conceal weapons before a police search and to attempt a break for liberty, threatened to shoot the sergeant shortly after his arrest on Michigan-st. near Rural.

While riding in the squad car, Graddy, according to police, thrust a gun in Sgt. Hague's abdomen, yelling, "If you coppers take me an inch further I'll kill this officer."

Sgt. Hague and Patrolman William Norman beat the bandit into submission, with mace and fist. Graddy had concealed the weapon in his pants-leg.

Later, according to police, he was identified by Samuel Arnett, drug store operator at 2801 E. 10th-st., as the man who held up Mr. Arnett and took \$21.78.

Police say Graddy signed a confession admitting the drug store holdup and also the holdup of a grocery operated by William Ozmon, 3602 E. 28th-st., on Jan. 22. He is charged with robbery, grand larceny and carrying concealed weapons. His home is Dawson Springs, Ky.

George Pete Petrakis, 17-year-old alleged probation violator, 346 N. Noble-st., on whom a gun was found after an attempt to escape from court, was sent back to the Marion County jail to "think" by Municipal Judge Charles Karabell today after his father, George Petrakis, demanded that his son be held for trial and jury.

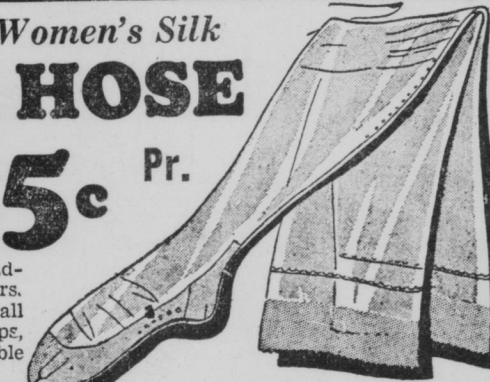
