

ROOSEVELT MAY ACCEPT INDIANA SPEAKING DATE

President Asked to Talk at
Rockport Event
July 4.

WASHINGTON, March 21.—Some slight assurance that President Roosevelt might make a Fourth of July speech at Rockport, Ind., has been given Rep. John W. Boehne Jr. Mr. Boehne made an appointment with the President to present the invitation of the Spencer County Historical Society, which is planning a program in honor of the moving of the Lincoln family to Indiana from Kentucky.

President Roosevelt told Mr. Boehne that it might be possible for him to stop off en route to the West, where he is scheduled to visit a big Public Works Administration dam project.

He pointed out that much depends upon the date upon which Congress adjourns.

\$200,000,000 GAIN IN INCOME SHOWN

25,000 More Expected to
Pay State Tax.

A \$200,000,000 increase in salaries and other income of Indiana citizens is revealed in gross income tax returns now being tabulated. Approx-

imately 25,000 more taxpayers than in 1933 are expected to be shown in the returns, according to Clarence Jackson, gross income tax division director.

The increase figure reveals, according to Mr. Jackson, that more persons are receiving \$1000 incomes than there were a year ago and that the average income for 1934 was higher. The increase in the average payment appears to be approximately 10 per cent. The total number of returns is expected to reach 300,000.

NURSERY SCHOOLS TO BE CONFERENCE'S TOPIC
