Bill Booked for Nov. 1 to Continue Policy of Offering  
Hollywood Stars in Person; Last Named Act  
Now Featured in Chicago.

Continuance of the policy of the Lyric Theater to present Hollywood stars in stage shows was announced today by Charles Olson in the booking of Roscoe Ates, stuttering comedian, beginning Friday, Nov. 1.

Mr. Olson stated, in addition to Ates, the bill will include two other headliners, Billy House, stage and film laugh maker, and Lottie Meyer's Disappearing Water Ballet.

Miss Meyer and her ballet now are headlined at the Chicago Oriental Theater. Mr. House appeared in "Murder at the Vanities" and "All the King's Horses," both movies.

# MacMurray's Crooning to Be Feature

Cast With Carole Lombard  
in Comedy Picture at  
Indiana.

Although once a featured singer on Broadway, Fred MacMurray does his first crooning for the movies in the new Paramount comedy, "Hands Across the Table," opening at the Indiana tomorrow. Carole Lombard takes the leading feminine role.

Sam Coslow wrote "The Morning After" especially for MacMurray and he sings it to Miss Lombard in one of the romantic moments of this gay picture.

MacMurray starred in athletics at Beaver Dam (Wis.) High School and later entered Carroll College at Waukesha. He worked his way through college by playing the saxophone with a Waukesha roadhouse band.

He stayed with the band, later joining an orchestra for a vaudeville tour. When the company landed in Hollywood, Fred went movie-minded and made a tour through the studios, seeking a job. His attempts ended in failure.

A man must eat and Fred found a place with a newly organized band called the "California Collegians." The musical troupe arrived in New York just as "Three's a Crowd" was opening. MacMurray was offered a part in a singing sketch with Libby Holman.

"Three's a Crowd" had one of the longest runs on Broadway, and before it was over, MacMurray had played nearly every part in the show.

When the show closed, there was another part awaiting him. Later, he played long engagements in "The Little Show" and "Roberta," and it was the latter show which brought him to the attention of Paramount.

Film tests and a contract followed. Fred MacMurray now is becoming a favorite in the scenes of his earlier disappointment. Hollywood reports that fan mail hasn't spoiled him and that he still "one of boys."
