

SALEM YOUTHS  
QUIZZED ABOUT  
CRIME SERIES

Held in Brownstown After  
Reported Attempt to  
Escape Police.

Thwarting the holdup of the  
Austin State Bank, state police  
today were questioning two Salem  
youths in connection with a series  
of southern Indiana burglaries.

Oral Barnard, 21, and Woodrow  
McNeely, 22, ex-convicts, are held  
in Brownstown following their  
arrest at Austin yesterday and their  
alleged admissions that they had  
entered stores in Orleans and Paoli.

Arms found in their possession are  
believed to have been stolen from  
the Salem National Guard Armory.

Nabbed at Bank Entrance  
A squad of state policemen under  
Sergeant Eugene Vance arrested the  
pair at the entrance of the Austin  
bank after they had received a tip  
that an attempt would be made to  
rob the institution.

Police said the youths attempted  
to escape while being taken from  
Indianapolis to Brownstown. Mc-  
Neely tried to wrest a revolver from  
Sheriff William Barkman, Jackson  
County. Sergeant Vance subdued him.  
They were placed in separate cells  
in Brownstown.

McNeely's wife and Mrs. Flossie  
Harmon, his sister, are held for  
questioning following a raid on the  
McNeely home that resulted in  
discovery of \$2500 in merchandise  
believed stolen.

Intended to Rival Dillinger  
State police said Eamond boasted  
that "we intended to put Dillinger  
in the shade." He escaped from the  
Salem jail last August while  
awaiting trial on a robbery charge.

McNeely is on parole from the In-  
diana State Reformatory.

Officers who aided in the arrest  
were Patrolmen Abe Taylor, Paul  
Armstrong and J. E. Neal. Capt.  
Matt Leach said the youths denied  
attempting to rob the Austin bank.

CONVENTION OF  
TOWNSENDITES  
ATTRACTS 5000

Delegates Hope to Shove  
Entire Plan Through  
Congress by 1937.

CHICAGO, Oct. 24.—More than  
5000 men and women, streaming  
into Chicago like converts to a re-  
ligious camp meeting, today opened  
the national convention called by  
Dr. F. E. Townsend, originator of a  
now-famous pension plan.

In a festive mood, they moved  
into hotel rooms, jostled in and out  
of convention headquarters and pre-  
pared for serious business.

Before the four-day session is

over they hope to have prepared a  
program which will show their en-  
tire plan through Congress by 1937.

Special trains and buses brought  
many of them into the city for the  
first time.

Three Section Train  
A train from the West Coast ar-  
rived in three sections. Forty buses  
came from Denver. Another train  
came from Florida and along the  
highways came battered automob-  
iles, trucks and trailers.

A temporary chairman and secre-  
tary were to be named, credentials  
and seating committees appointed,  
and voting delegates selected. In ad-  
dition, there were business, public  
policy, general resolutions and  
financial policy committees to be set
