Retired Railroad Conductor  
Had Worked 36 Years  
for Three Lines.

Last rites for Charles A. Boschen, 217 N. Pershing-av., retired passenger conductor, who died yesterday afternoon in the Methodist Hospital, are to be held at 2 tomorrow in Royster & Askin Mortuary. Burial is to be in Glen Haven Cemetery.

Mr. Boschen, 68, was an employee of the Peoria & Eastern Railroad until April, when illness forced his retirement. He was a conductor 36 years and formerly worked for the Pennsylvania and Big Four Railroads.

He was a member of the West Park Christian Church, a charter member of Evergreen Lodge No. 712, F. & A. M.; Ben-Hur Lodge, Order of Railway Conductors and Puritan Lodge No. 678, I. O. O. F.

Survivors are the widow, Mrs. Harriet Nolting Boschen; a son, M. G. Boschen, and three grandchildren.

**HABITUAL CRIMINAL**  
**LAW IS SUSTAINED**

State Supreme Court Denies Sammons' Appeal.

The Indiana habitual criminal law, providing that a life sentence may be given to a person convicted of three felonies, was upheld by the Supreme Court yesterday in denial of the appeal of James (Fur) Sammons, notorious gunman and former Capone associate.

Sammons has spent 26 of his 50 years in prison and once barely cheated the electric chair in Illinois.

Sentenced to life on the habitual criminal charge in Lake County, Sammons appealed on the grounds that the Lake prosecutor established only two of the four previous felony convictions with which he was charged when indicted for bribery.
