

STRENGTHENING OF NEUTRALITY LAWS FORESEEN

Rep. Larrabee Predicts Congressional Action in January.

Neutral laws are to be strengthened at the next session of Congress to further insure the United States from being drawn into armed conflict, Rep. William H. Larrabee predicted today.

Recently returned from a visit to Washington where he conferred with legislative leaders, Mr. Larrabee said he believed the session would be short. He is attending a relief agency conference here.

An early vote will be had on the bonus, which will pass the house by a large majority, Rep. Larrabee predicted.

Farm Legislation Indicated

He indicated there might be some legislation to protect the gains made for the farmers under the Agriculture Adjustment Act in view of recent court decisions which have been construed as dealing severe blows to existing laws.

"It is too early to determine just what form new legislation for the purpose of protecting improved farm prices may take and conditions may eliminate the need for any such action," he added.

Further conferences are to be held by legislative leaders to map procedure before Congress meets in January, Mr. Larrabee revealed.

Leaders Pleased

Administration leaders are pleased at present indications of business improvement, he said, adding:

"We are not satisfied and will continue every effort to safeguard the gains we have made and pave the way for further progress."

The Social Security Board is making excellent progress in preparing to administer the provisions of the law which provides unemployment insurance to all employed persons, the congressman declared.

He added that the attitude of most employers was most gratifying. "Many have called in person, sent representatives, or written the board seeking information which will aid them in complying with the terms of the law."

Sees Many Benefits

I believe that when this law comes into full effect the benefits will be so far-reaching that we will question only why such legislation was not enacted years ago. It will be a mighty fine thing for the laboring people to know that they will have a continuation of income from this source, even though laid off from work as the result of conditions beyond their own control, and to know that they will have a safe and steady income after they have reached the retirement age, he declared.

JURY CONVICTS TAIT AND PALS OF BURGLARY

Trio to Be Sentenced for Crime Saturday: Face Two to Five Years.

James Flaherty, Donald Nye and Ernest Tait today faced two to five-year prison terms following their conviction by jury yesterday in Criminal Court on charges of second degree burglary. They will be sentenced Saturday.

The jury of six men and six women brought in its verdict before Special Judge James D. Ernest in a heavily-guarded courtroom just a week after the trial began.

The prisoners were unmoved but Mrs. Anna Tait, foster mother of the generally recognized leader of the gang, became hysterical and had to be assisted from the courtroom.

Convicted of Burglary

The trio had been accused of burglary of Murphy's tavern on the West Side. The state succeeded in introducing confessions of Flaherty and Tait over bitter objection of defense counsel. Tait, his foster mother and a character witness for him were the only defense witnesses.

Tait denied the state's charge that he was shot by police in an unsuccessful attempt to rob the Speedway bank. He insisted he was wounded in a battle with hi-jackers near East St. Louis.

He caused a stir at one point by declaring that Kenneth Fowler, alleged bandit and fugitive, was a spectator at the trial Friday.
