Wee Duncy did as he was told. It made the little squirrel scold. "Aw, don't you worry," Goppy said. "We'll load them up again."

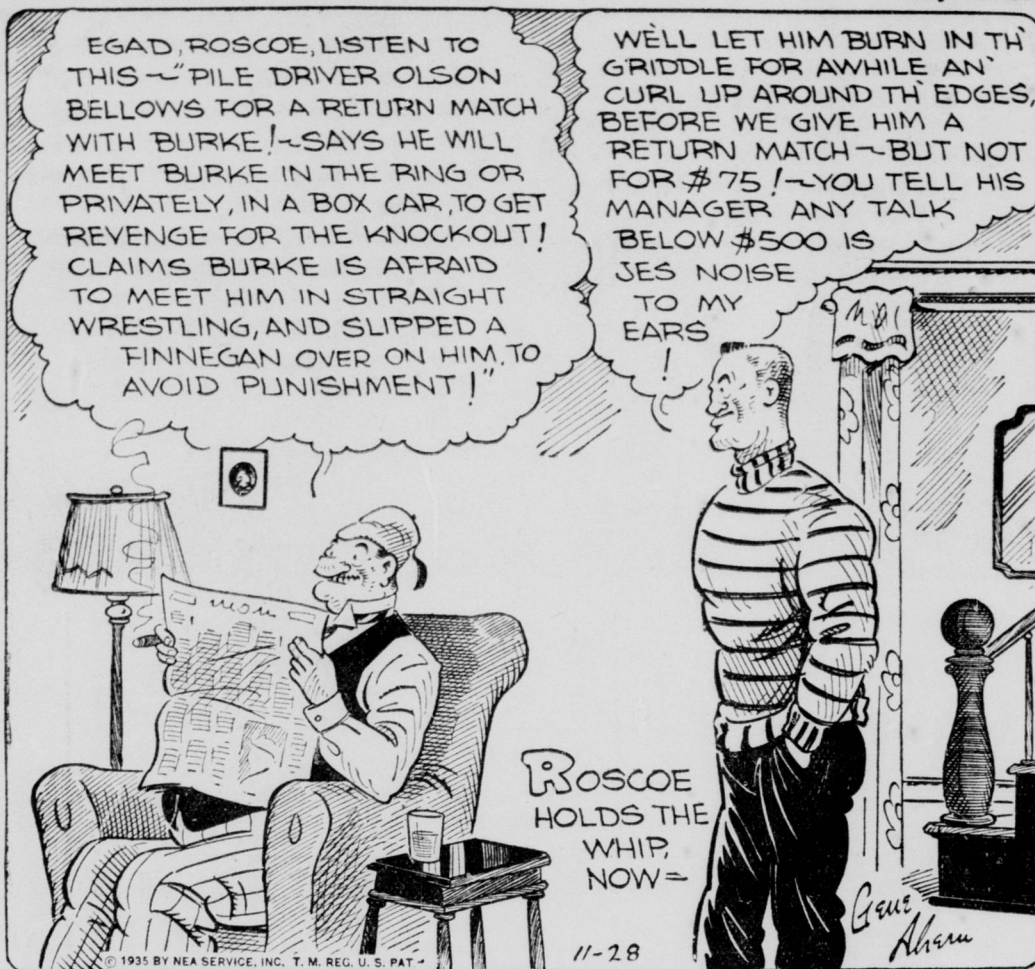
"Then you can store them in the tree. Poor Duncy gets too smart, you see. He tries to do things that he can't accomplish, now and then."

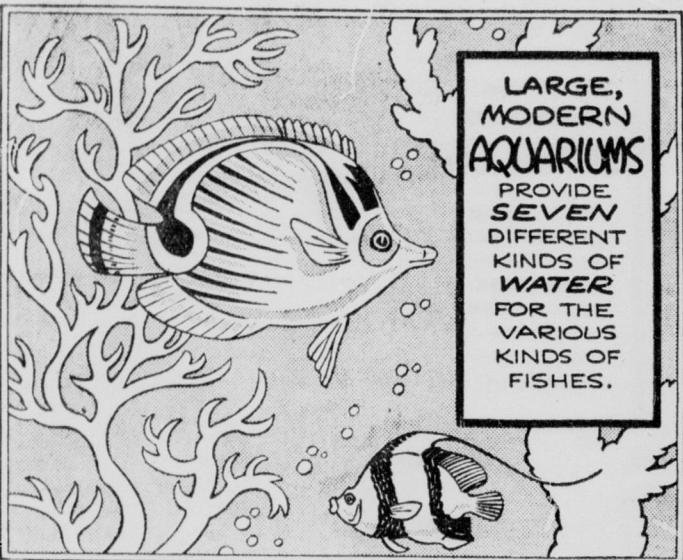

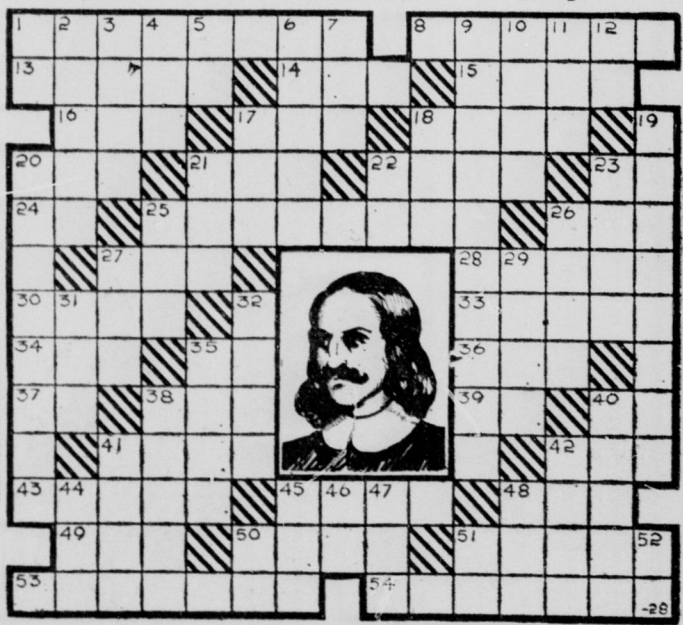

JUPITER has nine moons, and each one requires a different length of time to make its trip around the planet. Some travel more slowly than others, while the orbits vary greatly in size. The slowest moon, which also is the farthest away, requires nearly three years to make the circuit.

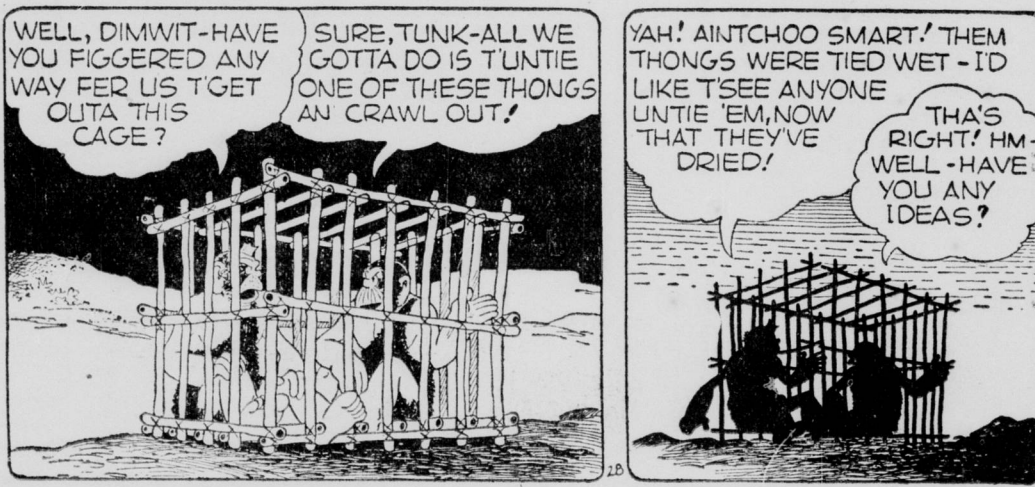
