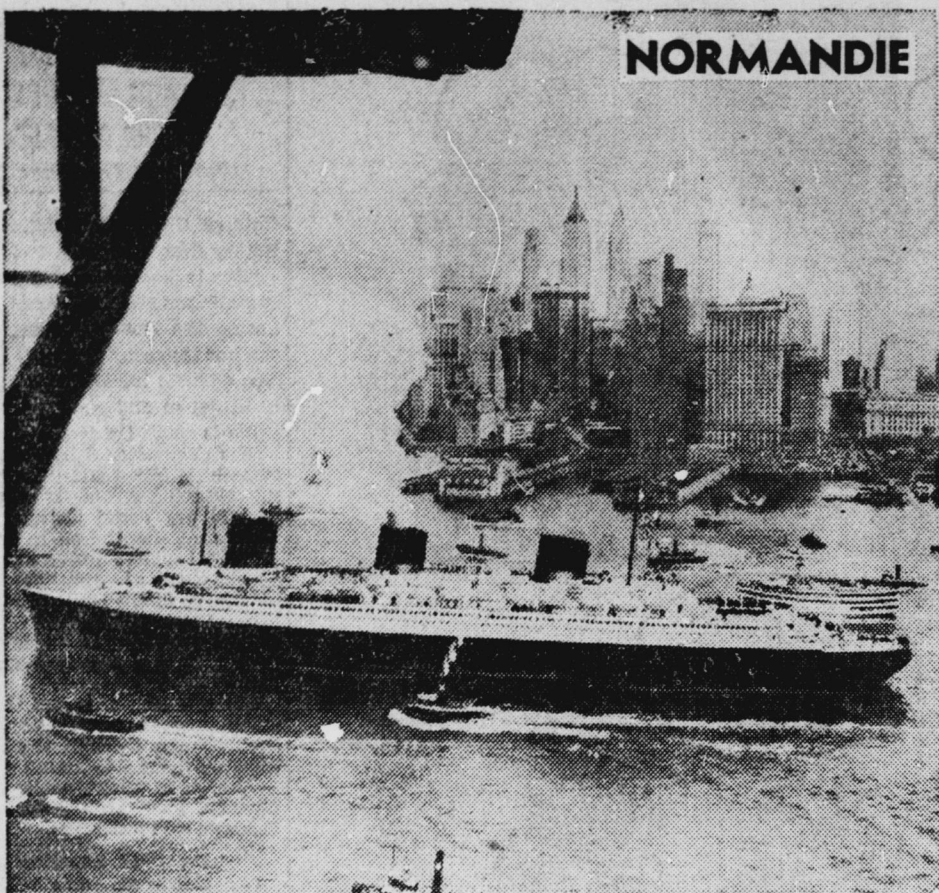


# Headline Events of 1935 as Recorded by the Camera



**NORMANDIE**

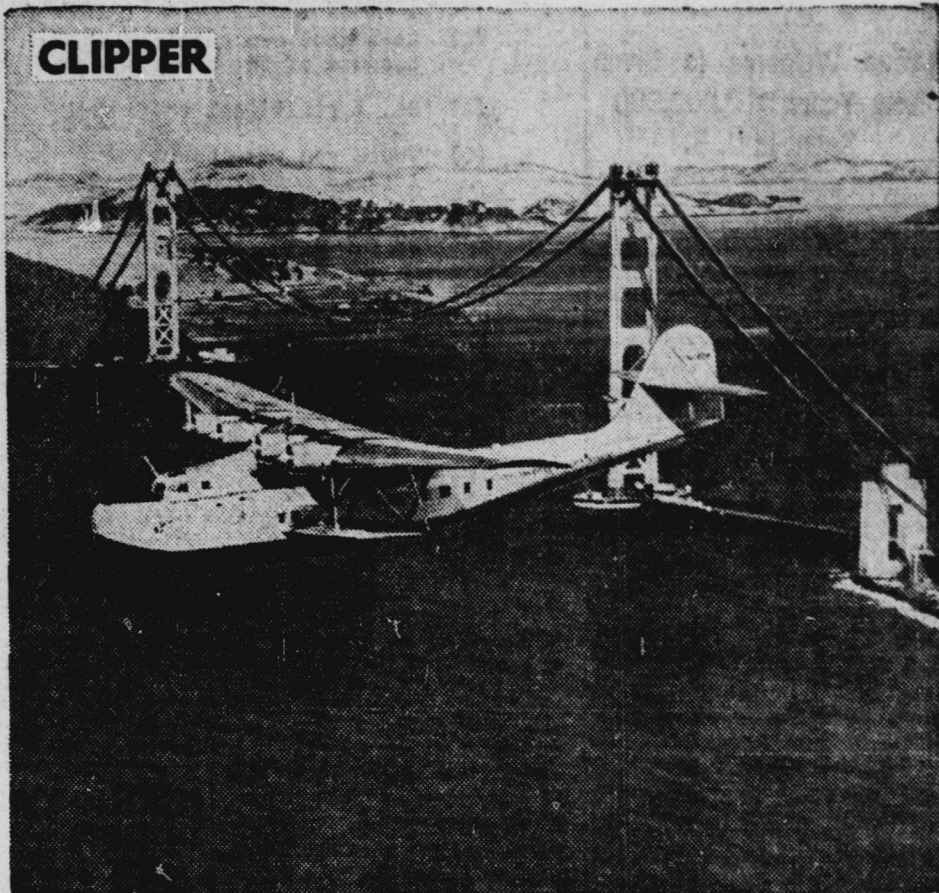
All Atlantic records for speed were broken as the giant French liner Normandie, new queen of the seas, arrived in New York in June on her maiden voyage.

**CLIPPER**

The Pacific, last great air barrier, was conquered in the first commercial flight by the China Clipper, seen here passing over another marvel, the Golden Gate bridge.



**WAR**

Boom of artillery, rattle of rifles and roar of planes sounded over East Africa as Italian soldiery embarked on the conquest of Ethiopia. Here, in a remarkable action picture by H. V. Drees, Ethiopian soldiers advance near Harar under cover of a road embankment, scattering at warning of an approaching Italian plane.



**KIDNAPING**

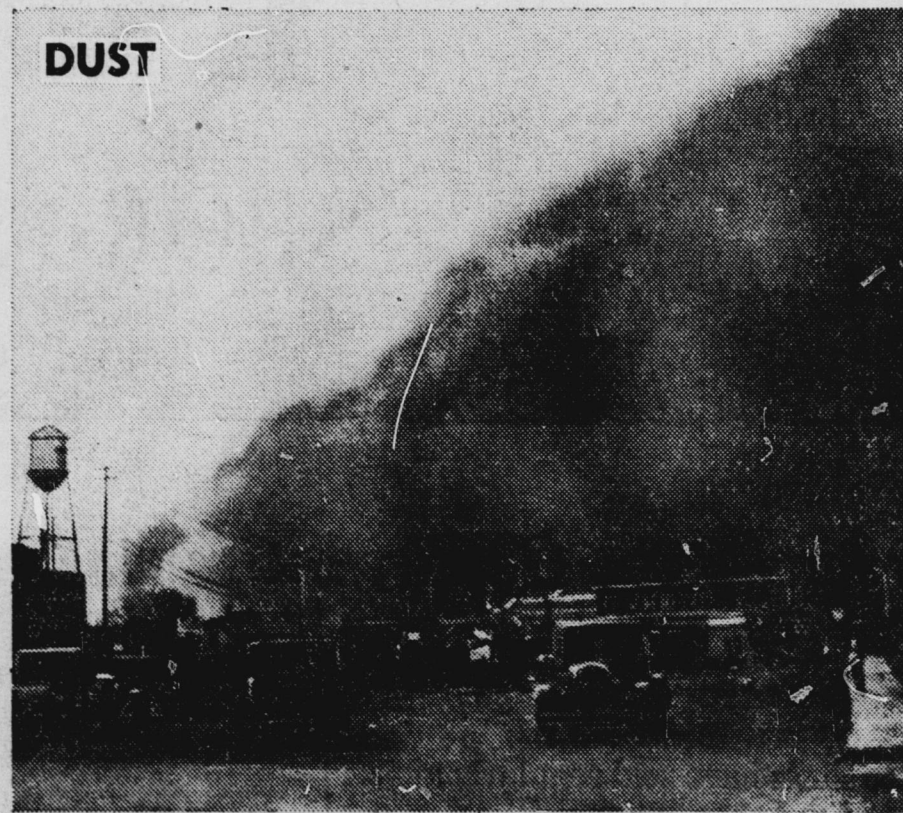
Sensational was the kidnaping of George Weverhauser, 8-year-old son of a lumber millionaire, at Tacoma. Here the boy, partly shielded from the camera by his father, enters the courtroom where his testimony helped convict abductors who were paid \$200,000 ransom.

**DIXIE**

Their life-belts tied fast in place, passengers on the S. S. Dixie spent three desperate days when the ship grounded on French Reef in a hurricane off Florida. All were rescued.



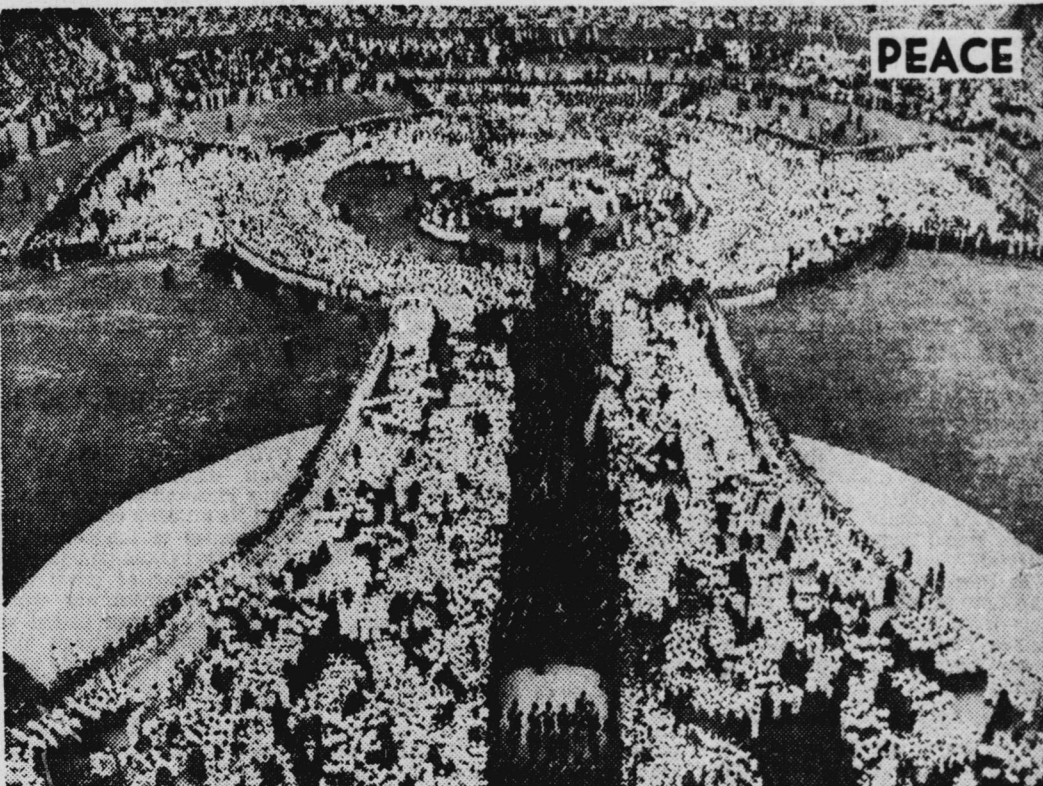
**DUST**

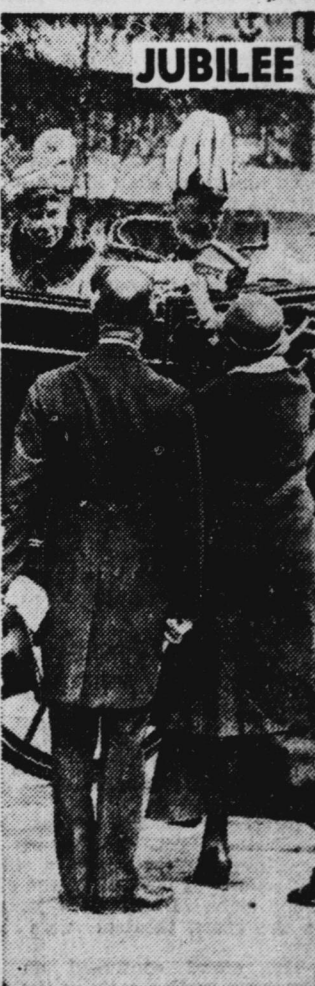
**PEACE**
