

1936-37 RELIEF PROGRAM LAID BY ROOSEVELT

Permanent Proposal Calls for Appropriation of \$1,500,000,000.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9.—A new congressional appropriation of \$1,500,000,000 to establish the Works Progress Administration on a permanent basis features New Deal work-relief plans for the 1936-1937 fiscal year, it was indicated today.

An allocation that size would increase the government's next annual deficit to \$2,998,000,000, compared to the \$3,234,000,000 established for 1936.

Authoritative sources said President Roosevelt was preparing to submit these recommendations to Congress around March 15.

1.—\$1,500,000,000 for Harry L. Hopkins' WPA to make jobs for around 2,750,000 needy for 12 months after July 1.

2.—Continuation of the Public Works Administration without new money for construction loans and grants to political subdivisions. Administrator Harold L. Ickes still would have a \$500,000,000 revolving fund for lending.

Some Money Unspent

The \$1,500,000,000 will not be the only sum the government will spend during 1936-1937 for work-relief. Mr. Roosevelt estimated in his budget message that \$1,103,000,000 of past WPA and PWA appropriations would be unspent July 1. It all has been obligated, however.

The new appropriation tentatively was decided upon by Mr. Roosevelt and Mr. Hopkins from figures showing that, up to Dec. 19, WPA had spent or allocated \$1,100,000,000 to make work for 2,678,629 persons.

In all, 3,500,000 needy now are on Federal work rolls. The number dependent on government-made work is expected to decline somewhat during the next year with increasingly large industrial pay rolls.

The projected plans for the last six months of this year and first of next, were put forward as Mr. Hopkins started compiling a report on the status of the whole \$4,000,000,000 program as required by Congress.

Included in Report

The Senate and House, in passing the appropriation resolution, provided that, on Jan. 10 for three successive years, work-relief officials must inform Congress on all their activities.

According to latest program figures compiled as Dec. 31, Mr. Hopkins has received \$1,169,390,271 to spend on his quick, cheap projects.

Of some \$7,000,000,000 in WPA applications, Mr. Roosevelt has approved \$4,527,199,383 in project values compared to \$4,475,374,122 by Comptroller-General John R. McCarr.

The President has authorized actual expenditure of \$1,177,502,723. Mr. McCarr has countersigned Treasury warrants amounting to \$1,169,390,271.

With more than \$3,000,000,000 in projects already in progress, he can be financed from present funds.

WPA officials pointed out they could start spending the \$1,500,000,000 without delay and with slight administrative expense.

NYA BEGINS PROBE OF PAROLE DELINQUENCIES

Young People From Relief Families to Be Inquired.

A study is being made today by the National Youth Administration into special factors contributing to repeated delinquencies among paroled Negro boys in Marion County.

Twenty-two young men and women, from the ages of 16 to 25, are to be employed for three months on the research. These employees are drawn from relief families.

Sponsor of the project is the Indianapolis Negro economic committee, a branch of the Indiana Economic Council. Office space has been provided by the Senate-av branch, Y. M. C. A.

National Business Leader Will Speak at Theater.

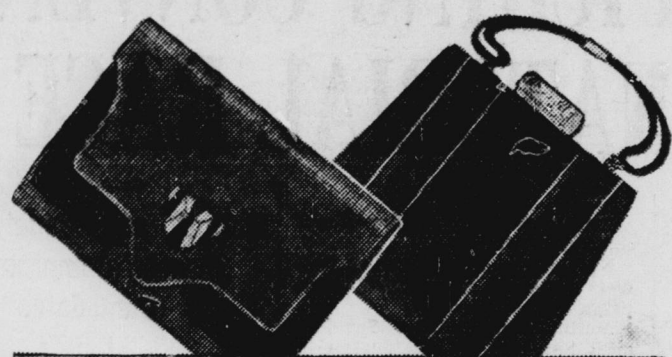

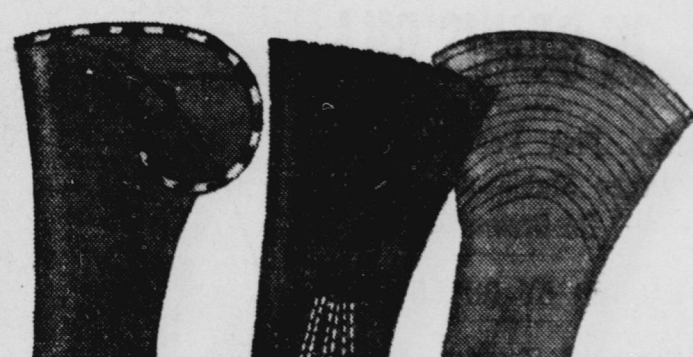
