

KERN BELIEVES IN MERIT PLAN FOR CITY JOBS

Mayor, Visiting in Florida, Says He Won't Seek Re-election.

"I believe the merit system of appointment and reward for police and fire departments is workable anywhere. In our case it has taken graft and corruption out of the two departments and raised the standard of personnel." This statement was made recently by Mayor Kern in an interview with a Miami newspaper. Mayor Kern rested there last week, returning to Indianapolis today.

Saying new blood is needed to take the "rotteness" out of the new crop of politicians to see that politics regains its lost dignity."

The Mayor said in the interview that he would not seek a second term as mayor, as he prefers judicial to administrative work. He indicated that President Roosevelt is considering him for appointment to the Federal Bench and that he probably would accept such an offer.

He declined to comment on national politics, in the interview, and explained, "President Roosevelt needs no defense from me. I'm certain he will be re-elected, and I know he will carry Indiana easily."

HAMMOND MAN ADMITS RELIEF ORDER FORGERY

Four Other Defendants Deny Complicity in Misappropriation.

Kroncke, a former government register clerk in Mr. Mehan's relief headquarters, admitted forging several relief grocery order claims.
