

## FEDERAL ROAD AID IS SOUGHT BY STATE BODY

Indiana Commission Goes to Washington to See U. S. Officials.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.—Members of the Indiana State Highway Commission are here today for a series of conferences which they hope will result in a restoration of \$3,000,000 of normal Federal highway funds for the state's program this year.

They are enlisting the aid of the Hoosier Congressional delegation to push their plan with Thomas McDonald, chief of the Federal Bureau of roads.

President Roosevelt suggested in his budget message that "normal Federal aid" for highways should be postponed for 1936-37, since states had not contracted for expenditure of funds already allocated.

Chairman James D. Adams of the Indiana commission points out that such is not the case in Indiana and if the normal \$3,000,000 is given now it can be readily expended.

Present funds are contracted 97 per cent and with the letting of one more contract will be 100 per cent under contract, he said.

Mr. Adams upon his arrival here yesterday was forced to remain in bed at his hotel because of a severe cold.


## 4 ACCOUNTANTS NAMED

## COKE PRICE RISE UNDER INQUIRY

Dr. Carr Begins Private Investigation for Benefit of Council.

Dr. Silas J. Carr, City Council vice president, today launched a private investigation into the rise in coke prices here. He plans to report his findings at the Council meeting Monday night.

Coke sells for \$9.25 a ton now, while before Nov. 1, the price was

\$8.90. Since the city now owns the gas company, Dr. Carr said the price should be much lower.

Civic organizations have inquired concerning the increased coke price, and Henry L. Dithmer, board president of the Citizens Gas and Coke Utility, explained that the price of

Pocahontas coal largely governed the price of coke because of the large quantity of this coal used in coke manufacture.

Mr. Dithmer said Pocahontas was higher this year than last due to increases in wages of miners and to strict regulations made operative re-


