Coast Rookie, Batting .667, Gets Four Hits in 13-8 Victory.

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla., March 20.—The New York Yankees crushed the Cincinnati Reds, 13 to 8, yesterday, winning their first exhibition game before about 2500 fans.

Joe Di Maggio, with four hits, again led the attack. The sensational coast rookie has a batting average of .667 for three games.

Lou Gehrig hit his first homer of the year in the fourth inning, bringing in three runs.

DEFUNIAK SPRINGS, Fla., March 20.—Five walks, two hit batsmen, five hits and a couple of errors allowed the New York Giants to score 11 runs in the fifth inning of yesterday's 19-to-7 swamping of the Nashville Vols.

Al Smith pitched the first four innings for the Giants and was followed by Dick Coffman.

LAKELAND, Fla., March 20.—Ray Berres, rookie catcher from Sacramento, and Jimmy Jordan were the stars of the Brooklyn Dodgers' 10-to-6 triumph over the world champion Detroit Tigers yesterday.

Berres, who it is said, can do everything but hit, got four bingles in four tries. Jimmy Jordan got four out of five including a triple to bring his batting record so far up to 10 hits in 19 times at bat.

ORLANDO, Fla., March 20.—Manager Buckey Harris of the Washington Nationals today was seeking another major league catcher and may offer some of his excess outfield talent in trade. Training has disclosed catching to be the National's weakest department, he said. Dick Lananah, pitcher, was the hero and Frank Petricolas, pitcher, was the goat of the Nat's 3-to-0 defeat by the Baltimore Orioles yesterday, the first in five Grapefruit League games.

HOUSTON, Tex., March 20.—Chicago's National League champions had to turn on the heat to come from behind and beat the Houston Buffs, 5 to 4. Successive doubles by Lillard and English, a single by Gill and a long fly by Galan turned the trick after Houston moundsmen limited the Cubs to four hits in the first eight innings.

Sees Million Dollar Gate

Jacobs Sure Louis-Schmeling Fight Will Hit New High for N. Y.

NEW YORK, March 20.—Promoter Mike Jacobs predicted today that the Joe Louis-Max Schmeling heavyweight bout will gross more than \$1,000,000, making the first fight attraction in history to hit that figure without Jack Dempsey. The match will be held either June 17 or 24 at Yankee Stadium, New York.

Jacobs narrowly missed a \$1,000,000 gate with the Louis-Baer bout last September. The gross was \$948,352, but, including motion picture and radio revenue, it went over the million mark.

"This time the gate itself will go better than \$1,000,000," Jacobs said.

Indicates \$25 Top

Ringside tickets for the Louis-Baer bout were \$25, and the same figure may prevail for the Louis-Schmeling bout. Jacobs indicated that he would rather have more people at a lower scale than a small crowd at high prices.

Alterations recently made at Yankee Stadium will increase the fight seating capacity to slightly more than 400,000. The largest paid attendance previously for a bout in New York was 85,000, at the Dempsey-Firpo bout in 1923 at the Polo Grounds. With the new seating arrangement at Yankee Stadium, Jacobs feels sure he will establish a new outdoor record for New York. The biggest fight crowd in history was 120,757—the first Dempsey-Tunney bout at Philadelphia.

Joe Raises the "Ante"

While Mike Jacobs is content to let his prediction on the gate rest at \$1,000,000, Joe Jacobs, manager of Schmeling, believes it will reach \$1,500,000.

"The people want to see just how good this Louis is," Joe said. "He has looked mighty good so far against some washed up fighters, but he still has to be tested.
