

COHAN TO STAR IN AIR DRAMA TONIGHT

'Song and Dance Man,' Which He Wrote, Is to Be Presented Locally Over Station WFBM

Actor Will Take Role of Hap Farrell in His First Full-Length Play Before Microphone at 8; Typist's Mistake Blamed for Shutting Minstrels From Air.

GEORGE M. COHAN, who doesn't like radio, will play his most famous of numerous stage roles for Radio Theater, CBS (WFBM) at 8 tonight. In "The Song and Dance Man," which the actor wrote and produced himself, he is to come to the microphone for his first full-length radio drama.

In tonight's presentation, Mr. Cohan is to play the part now closely associated with him, John (Hap) Farrell, of the vaudeville team of "Farrell and Carroll, Songs, Dances and Funny Sayings." The story concerns Hap's arrival in New York after 17 years as a trapper.

At an inexpensive boarding house, he finds Leola Lane, who had been kind to his partner. She is behind on her board, so Hap pays the bill with the last of his money. Broke, he tries to hold up a pedestrian with a "prop" revolver and lands in jail. When he gets a chance to tell his story, he is released, and finds friends and success when he goes back to being a "song and dance man."

Mr. Cohan was seen here last season playing the leading role in Eugene O'Neill's "Ah, Wilderness."

Frances White, singer and tap dancer, accepted the Lyric Theater's offer to her last night immediately after her performance on Maj. Bowes' Amateur Hour, and arrived here by airplane at noon today to join the Lyric's troupe at the Lyric. Miss White won enthusiastic applause from the WEAF studio audience last night.

Listeners to the NBC-WJZ WLW Minstrels at 8 tonight may feel certain that the show will not go off the air again for two minutes as it did last week. At least not for the same reason. Because a secretary omitted from the announcer's script an orchestra number, "I'd Rather Lead a Band," the announcer switched the show off the air on the chance that use of the music might not have been authorized by the copyright department. Forty-eight stations were silent, countless listeners surprised, but the show went on.

Hans Meuser, first bassoonist of the Indianapolis and the Cincinnati Symphony Orchestras, is to conduct the Cincinnati Woodwind Ensemble in a program on the Library of Congress chamber music series at 2:30 tomorrow afternoon, CBS (WFBM). Members of the ensemble are Karin Davas, piano; Louis Fritz, flute; Marcel Dandolis, oboe; Joseph Elliott, clarinet, also a member of the local orchestra; Max Hess, horn, and Mr. Meuser, bassoon. All are members of the Cincinnati orchestra.

This orchestra has one of the finest woodwind choirs in the country, and Indianapolis Symphony patrons who have enjoyed the playing of Mr. Elliott and Mr. Meuser this year agree that they have few peers among artists in their particular fields.

Moved up from its regular Tuesday night spot last week, the Sigmund Romberg program is to be heard again at 8:30 tonight, via NBC-WEAF (WLW). The guest star of the last program, Josephine Tuminia, young coloratura soprano who made her debut with the San Francisco Opera Co. this season, is to be heard again, at the request of many listeners. She has chosen to sing "Ah, Fors e Lui," Violetta's famous aria from the first act of Verdi's "La Traviata." A group of Chopin transcriptions will feature the orchestral part of the broadcast.

The Brahms Piano Quartet in G Minor and one of the Beethoven string quartets are scheduled on the NBC Music Guild program through WEAF at 12:45 tomorrow, played by Harry Kaufman and the Gordon String Quartet. The Brahms work, written in the composer's twenty-ninth year, dates from Brahms' most productive years of chamber music writing. It was composed shortly before he took up his permanent residence in Vienna.

Word comes that arrangements have been completed for an added Metropolitan Saturday matinee opera this week to be broadcast from the stage of the Boston Opera House. The vehicle will be "Carmen," sung again by Rosa Ponselle—a combination which has been the "Met's" biggest box-office attraction this season. Both NBC networks are to broadcast the program as usual.

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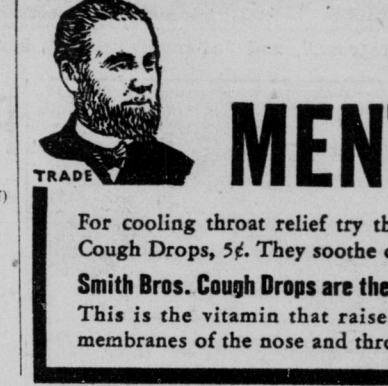
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NEW SCHOOL IS TO BE ERECTED AT NEW BETHEL

Franklin Township Voters Give Approval to Program of Consolidation.

The erection of the Franklin Township consolidated high school at New Bethel was assured today. The building program is to include a new gymnasium with several classrooms adjoining and complete modernization of the present New Bethel school.

The township has advertised a bond issue and also is to seek government funds for the building. A referendum was held Saturday in agreement with the State Board of Tax Commissioners to settle a lengthy controversy over modernization of school buildings in the township. Of 854 ballots cast, 462 persons

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voted for building the consolidated school, 202 for remodeling school plants at New Bethel and Acton and 190 to continue with the present buildings.

Ed Cook, township trustee, arranged the referendum. Members of the advisory board were election judges.

Matt Leach and Detective Donald Winn told the commission that the sisters, Mrs. Hazel McNeely and Miss Flossie Harmon, both of Salem, made possible the arrest of Woodrow McNeely, husband of Mrs. McNeely, and Oral Bernard. The two men, now serving prison sentences, were planning to rob an Austin bank, according to police. The two women were sentenced on charges of receiving stolen goods.
