

# MISSIONARIES IN CITY TO REPORT ON FIELD WORK

Japanese Hold U. S. in High Regard, Conference Is Told.

Four foreign missionaries today gave their impressions of conditions in the countries in which they served.

The four, with eight others, are attending a conference of foreign missionaries of the Church of the Disciples of Christ which opened yesterday at the United Christian Missionary Society, 222 S. Downey-st., and closes tomorrow at noon.

Dr. Thomas Becker, Young, instructor in Sei Gakuin Boy's High School in Tokyo, Japan, said, "The Japanese have only the warmest regard for the American nation."

**Competition Is Danger Point**  
One danger point in American-Japanese relations exists, however, Dr. Young said. That is the challenge created by Japan's legitimate competition in the markets of the world.

Japan's attitude toward the Far Eastern question, he said, might be termed an Asiatic Monroe Doctrine, comparable with the United States' own policy in the past toward outside interference with affairs in Latin America.

"Japan," he said, "feels that the destiny of the East rests with herself and China without European intervention." Dr. Young has been in Japan for the past 25 years.

**Chinese Uplifted Discussed**  
Geographically, one of Dr. Young's neighbors, the Rev. Edwin Marx, Nanking, China, who has been in the United States since 1934, laid the cause of the internal upheaval in China to the change from medieval to modern civilization.

"The Chinese," he declared, "simply are trying to realize a democratic form of government and to bring in modern machinery and the factory system of production. Millions of men in China have been under arms. Many deserted from military bodies, some following leaders and some leaderless."

**Russian Influence Noted**  
Communism gained its foothold in China, the Rev. Marx explained, when Dr. Sun Yat Sen, organizer of the Nationalist movement, entered into an alliance with the Soviet in order to assure the success of the revolution.

The Rev. Marx is administrative secretary of the China Mission of the Disciples of Christ in the lower Yangtze valley.

Dr. A. E. Elliott, director of Colegio International at Asuncion, Paraguay, supported by the Disciples of Christ, declared that one of the economic changes to be brought about in Paraguay by the Gran Chaco war with Bolivia would be a change in the method of transport.

**War Brings Motors**  
The war, according to Dr. Elliott, brought thousands of motor vehicles into the country and sales of gasoline and the building of roads reacted accordingly.

Much of the funds for road building were derived from the income on cotton crops in 1934, while Paraguay's able-bodied manhood and youth was at the front.

In that year, because of the curtailment of cotton under the AAA in the United States, Paraguay's income from the crop was greater than at any time during its history, he said.

**Africa Feels League Failed**  
Although living 1000 miles from the scene of the Italo-Ethiopian conflict, Dr. Herbert E. Smith, who has spent more than 25 years in Africa in the Belgian Congo at Bolenge, said, "The African races feel that the white races have let them down in the failure of the League of Nations to prevent Italy from her designs on Ethiopia."

Other missionaries attending the conference are Ray E. Price of Damoh, India; Miss Ruth Leslie, Mexico; Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Hurt, formerly of Indianapolis, now of Bolenge, Africa; Virgil E. Havens, Wema, Africa, Belgian Congo; P. D. Snipes, Bolenge; Miss Wenona Wilkinson, Luchowfu, China; Howard T. Holroyd, Mexico City; Misses Stella and Joseph Franklin, formerly of Anderson, Ind.

The missionaries in their private conference here are discussing problems relating to the foreign mission field and the best means of presenting them to the American public.

## HIGH SCHOOL PUPILS IN POSTER CONTEST

Winner of Competition to Receive Scholarship.

Sixty-eight Indiana high school pupils, including two from the Sacred Heart School here, are participating in a health poster contest sponsored by the Indiana Tuberculosis Association, the John Herron Art School, the State Health Board, the State Department of Public Instruction and the State Teacher Association art section.

The winner is to be awarded a full year scholarship at the John Herron Art School. Purpose of the contest is to raise the standards of health posters and stimulate health interest generally.

The posters are to be displayed at the Lieber Art Gallery, 24 W. Washington-st., until Saturday when they are to be judged by Frederick Polley, Technical High School; Dr. Howard Mettel of the State Health Board; Miss Margaret Paddock, State Public Instruction Department; Donald M. Matteson, Herron Art School director, and Murray A. Auerbach, Indiana Tuberculosis Association executive secretary.

The four winning posters are to be announced at the tuberculosis association annual meeting April 14. The art school is to select the final winner.

## AAA ANNOUNCES PAYMENT RATES FOR SOIL WORK

Specifications for Crop Method Are Listed for Indiana.

A list of soil-building practices which would qualify co-operating producers in Indiana for soil building payments under the Federal soil conservation program was announced today by the Agricultural Adjustment Administration.

The list of practices approved with the payments which are to be allowed and conditions of payment include:

**Seedings of alfalfa and sericea**, \$2 an acre when seeded on crop land between Oct. 1, 1935, and Sept. 30, 1936, inclusive. Red clover and mammoth clover, \$1.50 an acre when seeded on crop land in the same period. Legume mixtures, \$1.50 an acre under the same conditions.

**Legume Mixture Specifications**  
Legume mixtures which contain 50 per cent or more of alfalfa clover, sweet clover, white clover or Korean Lespedeza, or any two or more of these legumes are eligible for payment of not more than \$1 an acre.

If non-leguminous hay and pasture grasses, such as timothy and red top, are seeded with the legume mixture they must be in addition to the normal qualities of these legume seeds used when such legumes are seeded without the addition of non-leguminous hay and pasture seed grasses.

**Limestone Application Listed**  
Application of at least two tons of ground limestone an acre, \$2.50 an acre when applied on crop land or pasture between Jan. 1, 1936 and Sept. 30, 1936, inclusive.

**Planting of forest trees**, \$5 an acre when planted on crop land or pasture land between Jan. 1, 1936 and Sept. 30, 1936, inclusive.

and Sept. 30, 1936, inclusive. Such plantings should be in accord with the state forestry recommendations. Soil building payments for the practices are not to be made when the labor, seed or materials are furnished free by a state or Federal agency. A good stand of legume is to constitute proof of performance, unless the Secretary of Agriculture approves other proofs of performance.
