

## LEGION AERIAL DRIVE RECORD IS SHATTERED

812,000 Memberships Are  
Flown to City in  
Annual Roundup.

All records for the American Legion's annual aerial membership drive stood shattered today with the national membership total at an all time high of 812,000. Last year's total of 754,000 was the previous record.

More than 70 planes participated yesterday in the annual drive while approximately 25,000 persons thronged Municipal Airport. The planes brought in \$2,800 pair-up membership cards from all parts of the country.

Prominent among those who flew to the airport in the annual roundup were Maj. Gen. Oscar Westover, Army Air Corps chief, and David E. Grant, New York, foreign counsel of Pan-American Airways.

### Greeted by Murphy

They were greeted by Ray Murphy, Ida Grove, Ia., Legion national commander who also was the official welcomer for the Des Moines (Ia.) Register-Tribune's "flying news room," Good News 6th, which carried the Iowa department's membership cards.

Maj. Gen. Westover spoke last night at the annual roundup banquet at the Antlers. He said the United States Air Corps lacks equipment and is four and one-half years behind its program.

This program, formulated in 1930, has been hampered by curtailed budgets, he said, and while this year's budget is more generous, it will not provide for many new ships.

### Other Speakers Listed

Other speakers were Dudley M. Steele, Los Angeles, national chairman of the Legion's aeronautics commission; Dr. W. W. Arrasmith, Grand Island, Neb., vice chairman of the commission, and Mr. Grant. Many national Legion officials and committeemen arrived yesterday for spring meetings today and tomorrow at national headquarters.

### 2 STREET CAR LINES REROUTED DOWNTOWN

E. Michigan and Lincoln Units  
Follow New Loops.

Due to pending street improvements, street cars on the E. Michigan and Lincoln lines today were being operated over different downtown routes.

E. Michigan-st cars were routed on Maryland-st west to Illinois-st, north on Illinois-st to Washington-st, and east on Washington-st over the regular route. Lincoln cars were sent north on Illinois-st to Georgia-st, west on Georgia-st to Capitol-av, north on Capitol-av to Washington-st, east on Washington-st to Illinois-st and south on Illinois-st over its former route.

Cars operating on the two lines previously had been routed over Meridian-st between Washington and Maryland-sts.

## LOCAL DOCTOR IS MADE HEAD OF NEW UNIT

Dr. Howard B. Mettel to  
Direct State Maternal,  
Child Health.

Dr. Howard B. Mettel, Indianapolis physician, has been placed in charge of the new state department of child and maternal health organized under the terms of one of the three social security measures enacted in the recent special session of the Legislature.

Dr. Verne K. Harvey, Indiana Division of Public Health director, said other appointments are to be made soon.

The new department's work, according to Dr. Mettel, will involve

an expenditure of about \$120,000 annually, one-half provided by the Federal government. General education, particularly in rural and underprivileged areas, in fact pertaining to child and maternal health, will be provided.

Dr. Mettel is secretary of the Indiana Medical Society and has specialized in pediatrics in Indianapolis for the last 10 years. He is a native of Connersville and was graduated from Connersville High School and the University of Michigan School of Medicine.

## ALLEGED SLAYER IS LYNCHED IN GEORGIA

Negro Killed by Mob of 200; Judge Promises Probe.

PAVO, Ga., May 4.—Judge W. E. Thomas of Thomas County Superior Court, today pressed an investigation into the mob lynching last night of John Rushin, 55-year-old

Negro, accused of fatally stabbing one white man and seriously wounding another.

The Negro's bullet-riddled body was found near a creek, about 300 yards from a main highway, near the scene of the stabbing yesterday of Marion Pate, 25, and Will Peary, Pate died. A mob of 200 armed men seized Rushin from a deputy sheriff. The lynching was the second in Georgia in a week.
