

62 DETOURS ON INDIANA ROADS ARE ANNOUNCED

Highway Bulletin Shows Spring Improvement Work Under Way.

An increased volume of State Highway Commission spring improvement projects was evidenced today with the commission's announcement of 62 detours in effect throughout the state.

United States and state highways affected are:

State 2—From Westville east and north, three miles over bituminous and gravel roads. From Mishawaka to Elkhart, 8.5 miles over concrete road.

U. S. 6—From Butler east, four miles over city streets. State Road 1 and county road.

State 9—From State Road 67 south of Pendleton to Huntsville, shoulder construction. Drive carefully.

State 13—From Wabash northeast to State Road 24, three miles city streets and gravel road.

State 15—From Marion to La Fontaine, 13 miles over State Roads 9, 105 and gravel road. From Wabash to State Road 114, 20 miles over State Roads 13, 213 and 114.

From Silver Lake east and north, 14 miles over State Road 14, gravel and concrete road.

State 18—From State Road 152 north and east over State Road 152 and gravel.

U. S. 24 Split

U. S. 24—From Wabash northeast, east-bound, 12.5 miles over gravel road.

Westbound follow State Road 24 to State Road 13 and 12, detour to Wabash.

State Road 30 to New Haven, two miles over State Road 30 and New Haven streets.

State 25—From Rochester to Menton, 20 miles over State Roads 14 and 19.

State 26—From Shelbyville to Indianapolis, 24 miles over State Roads 9, 52.

U. S. 31—From State Road 8 to South Bend, 29 miles over State Roads 8, 331 and concrete road.

State 33—From New Albany to State Road 60, 12 miles over State Roads 31-W and 60. Local traffic can detour around over gravel road and State Road 31.

State 34—From Warrington to Crawfordsville, 29 miles over State Roads 25 and 53.

U. S. 36—East of Danville, shoulder construction, drive carefully. From Indianapolis to State Road 9 south of Pendleton, 85 miles over State Roads 40 and 9.

Detour at Danville

State 39—From Danville to Lebanon, 30 miles over gravel and State Road 34. From State Road 18 to Delpi four miles over gravel road and city streets.

U. S. 40—From Terre Haute to State Road 43, 44 miles over State Roads 41, 36 and 43. From Cambridge City to E. Germantown, construction, drive carefully.

East of Cambridge City, two-lane traffic through bridge, drive carefully.

U. S. 41—South of Fort Branch, construction, drive carefully. Just north of White River near Hamilton, construction, drive slowly. Three miles south of Vincennes, bridge run-around. From Cook to U. S. 30, unfinished shoulders, drive carefully. Trucks advised to follow State Roads 20, 53 and 152. From State Road 30 west and north to State Road 6, 7 miles over State Roads 30, 141.

State 43—From Lafayette north 5.5 miles over city streets and bituminous road. From Westville to Michigan City, 14 miles over State Road 6, concrete and oil mat roads.

State 46—From Bloomington to Nashville, 23 miles over State Roads 49 and 133.

State 47—From Thorntown east to State Road 59 over gravel road and State Road 52.

U. S. 50—Just west of Shoals, drive carefully due to settlement of road. Just north of Aurora, bridge run-around.

U. S. 52—Near southeast city limits of Indianapolis, 1.7 miles, bridge run-around over bituminous and oiled gravel roads.

From Indianapolis, north to 11st-st, 14 miles over State Road 29 and concrete.

From 11st-st to 10th-st, shoulder construction, drive carefully. From West Lafayette north 2.5 miles over city streets and concrete.

State 54—Just west of Bloomfield, drive carefully due to settlement of road.

State 59—From State Road 46 to Brazil, 14 miles over State Road 46, gravel and State Road 42.

State 62—From Jeffersonville, north and east, 49 miles over State Roads 31 and 18.

State 64—At St. Anthony, bridge run-around.

State 67—From Indianapolis to Anderson, 41 miles over State Roads 13 and 32.

State 114—From Akron east, 14 miles over State Roads 14 and 15.

State 115—Closed from State Road 24 to State Road 15 northeast of Wabash.

State 116—From Markle to Bluffton, 14 miles over State Roads 224 and 1.

State 136—From North Salem southeast four miles over gravel and bituminous.

From Danville, west and north, five miles over State Road 36, gravel and oil mat roads.

U. S. 224—From Magley to Decatur, 8.5 miles over gravel and brick roads.

State 234—From State Road 43 east to Jamestown, 27 miles over State Roads 43 and 34.

State 236—From State Road 67 east, 8.5 miles over State Road 67 and gravel.

State 250—From State Road 50 east to Mitchell, 17 miles over State Roads 50 and 47.

FARMERS HEAR TALK ON SEED CORN CARE

Growers From 5 Central Indiana Counties Attend Meeting.

Farmers from five central Indiana counties last night heard a discussion on the proper methods of planting, growing, drying and storage of hybrid corn.

The meeting in the Washington was called in an effort to overcome next year the condition that prevailed this year when most of the seed corn was found dead due to the extreme cold weather, according to Horace E. Abbott, county agricultural agent.

About 50 corn growers from Marion, Shelby, Hamilton, Hendricks, and Hancock Counties attended.

CONTRACTS AWARDED FOR NEW ROAD WORK

Highway Construction in 3 Counties Is to Cost \$225,000.

Highway improvement contracts aggregating approximately \$225,000 have been awarded by the State Highway Commission.

The projects, to be completed this year, are in Monroe, St. Joseph and Gibson Counties. One of the contracts was let to the Burns Construction Co., Indianapolis. It was for paying with reinforced concrete a 456-mile stretch on Roads 46 and 37 in Bloomington.

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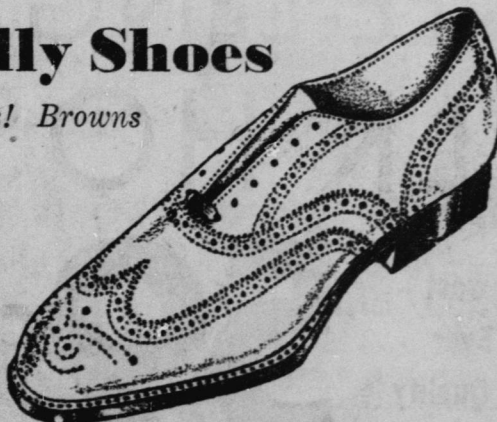


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
