

## CHURCH TO END STATE MEETING WITH REPORTS

Disciples of Christ to Hear Ida B. Wise Smith at Session Today.

BLOOMINGTON, Ind., May 13.—Sectional conferences and presentation of committee reports today was to conclude the ninety-seventh annual state convention of the Disciples of Christ Church.

Mrs. Ida B. Wise Smith and Mrs. E. C. Homrighausen were to address the more than 450 delegates who have attended the three-day meeting.

M. R. Denison, South Bend automobile executive, urged the delegates to devote more time and effort to their five-year program in an address before the convention last night.

**Loss Is Cited**  
Denison cited a loss of approximately 1000 members in the first year of the program which started in 1934 and which will culminate with the hundredth state convention of the Disciples in Indianapolis in 1939.

He said that 32,000 more members must be gained to attain the church's goal of 200,000 members at completion of the five-year program.

Election of officers of the Indiana Christian Ministerial Association was announced by convention officials. They included: The Rev. Allen Huber, Frankfort, president; the Rev. L. J. Kerick, Indianapolis, vice president; the Rev. Harry T. Bridwell, Indianapolis, secretary-treasurer.

Nominees for the Board of Directors were the Rev. R. C. Dillman, Jeffersonville; H. H. Purkiser, Mitchell; Henry Erlwine, Marion; the Rev. L. G. Gray, Sheridan, and Bridwell.
