

ROTARY CLUBS ARE TO ELECT NEW GOVERNOR

Two Nominated for District Post; 500 Delegates Hear Speakers.

LA FAYETTE, Ind., May 13.—C. Seymour Bullock, South Bend, and Maurice E. Louth, Kokomo, were nominees for district governor to be elected today at the twenty-third annual conference of the twenty-third district of the Rotary International.

The choice of the 500 delegates is to be subject to the approval of the international convention.

W. W. Emerson, Winnipeg, Canada, director of Rotary International, and Dr. Edward E. Elliott, Purdue University president, were to speak at today's sessions.

MONROE COUNTY BOARD FIRES OFFICE HOLDERS

Death of G. O. P. Member Brings Shake-Up in Personnel.

BLOOMINGTON, Ind., May 13.—Changes in appointive offices of Monroe County were announced today by Democrats who have gained control of the County Commission.

Albert Todd, a Democrat, was appointed to succeed William Weimer, deceased Republican member of the board, and the changes were made in every appointive office except that of road superintendent.

The two Democratic members, Mr. Todd and William Acuff, incumbent, ordered contracts of the county attorney, custodians, physician and matron, who were appointed by the Republican-controlled commission, cancelled.

C. O. Mattingly, Monroe County Young Democrats president, was appointed county attorney.
