

WIRE IS TO PRESENT TRAFFIC FORUM

Station Takes Turn Tomorrow in Sponsoring Safety Series; Tschaikowsky Talk Scheduled

Local Accident Prevention Experts to Speak on Program.

The second of a new series of WIRE traffic forums, designed to aid the drive for greater motoring safety, is to be broadcast at 11 tomorrow afternoon. Each week a different local organization is to present the program, with WIRE sponsoring tomorrow's broadcast. The National Youth Administration was in charge of the inaugural program last week.

Martin M. Clinton, formerly director of public relations for William Penn College, is in charge of the educational series. Sgt. Edward F. Moore of the traffic division of the Indianapolis police department, and Stephen D. Crain, N.Y.A. Indianapolis traffic violation survey superintendent, are to be regular speakers. Guest speakers also are to be heard on the programs each week.

J. Edgar Hoover, director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, whose G-men have apprehended the country's most notorious criminals, is to address Boys' Clubs of America at 7:15 tonight when he speaks on the NBC-WJZ network. His talk, originating at an anniversary dinner of the organization, is to center around the need for increased crime prevention work among America's young people and the great value of boys' clubs in this respect.

At 8 tonight CBS (WFBM) is to present another of the Gang Buster series in which Phillips Lord dramatizes the capture of notorious criminals. Despite statements from G-men that they had no outside clues to help apprehend Thomas H. Robinson Jr. in Glendale, Cal., recently, Mr. Lord has contended his program led to Robinson's identification.

Claims Aid to G-Men

Early this year, a dramatization of the Stoll kidnapping case was presented by Gang Busters, and Robinson's description was included. According to Mr. Lord, it was his description which Lynn Allen, drug store clerk, remembered when he saw the kidnaper in his store and notified officers.

Russian Master of Music Is to Be Dr. Mason's Topic on NBC.

Dr. Daniel Gregory Mason is to continue his series of informal discussions of "Musicians as Men" at 12:30 tomorrow on the NBC Blue network, with Peter Ilitch Tschaikowsky as the subject.

Dr. Mason is to illustrate his remarks with examples of the Russian master's music at the piano, and is to be assisted by such distinguished artists as Jacques Gordon, violinist; Joseph Schuster, pianist; Clarence Adler, pianist, and Alfred Drake, baritone.

Works to Be Played

The program is scheduled to begin with three excerpts from the "Symphonie Pathétique," played by Dr. Mason. This work was performed first in St. Petersburg, Oct. 28, 1893, with the composer conducting. The audience and critics received it coldly. Next day Tschaikowsky was casting about for some other title than "No. 6" for the symphony. His brother, Modeste, suggested "Tragic," but Peter was not satisfied.

"I left the room before he had come to a decision," the brother wrote. "Suddenly I thought, 'Pathetic.' I went back to the room and I said the word to Peter."

"Splendid, Modi, bravo—'Pathetic!' And he wrote in my presence the title that will forever record the stage and the great value of boys' clubs in this respect."

Other compositions on the program are the first movement of Tschaikowsky's only trio, the "Don Juan" serenade, and selected solos by Mr. Gordon and Mr. Drake.

Prize-winning choral compositions of the Festival of American Music are to be given their radio premieres on the CBS chain at 12:45 tomorrow (WFBM at 1). The competition which closed today, was sponsored by the Westminster Choir School, Princeton, N. J., and the winning numbers are to be sung by the school choir.

Announcement of the contest was made by Roy Harris, well-known American composer and member of the Westminster School faculty, during a New York Philharmonic Symphony Orchestra concert last fall. Hundreds of manuscripts were submitted.

In addition to new compositions, Mr. Harris' "Symphony for Voices" is to be sung. Those who heard the Westminster Choir in its Indianapolis appearance this season will remember Mr. Harris' symphonic use of voices in the "Song for Occupations."

Another concert by New Jersey singers is scheduled at 3:30 on the NBC Red network and WIRE by the Trenton State Teachers College Choir. A list of familiar and lovely choruses are promised: Bach's "All Breathing Life" (also done here by the Westminster group); the same composer's chorale, "Grant Us to
