

6 NEW DETOURS ESTABLISHED ON ROADS IN STATE

Temporary Reroutings Are Listed in Highway Bulletin.

Six new detours, in addition to those already in effect on the Indiana State Highway System, were listed in the highway detour bulletin today. They affect U. S. 40, city streets in Cambridge City; U. S. 24 at Roanoke; U. S. 31 in Peru and north; Ind. 140, from U. S. 40 to Knightstown, and Ind. 356 north from just west of the junction with Ind. 62.

Construction work on Ind. 43 north of Lafayette has been completed and the detour removed.

Detours are:

Ind. 3—From Westville east and north, 3 miles over county highway and gravel road, from Mishawaka to Elkhart, 8.5 miles over county gravel road.

U. S. 24—From Butler east, 4 miles over Ind. 140 and county road.

Ind. 3—From Ind. 62 south of Pendleton to Huntington, shoulder construction; drive carefully.

Ind. 13—From Wabash northeast to U. S. 24, 3 miles over city streets and county gravel road.

Ind. 25—From Marion to LaFontaine, 13 miles over U. S. 152 and county gravel road.

From Wabash to U. S. 140 north, 11.4 miles over county gravel road, from East to West, 14 miles over Ind. 140, county gravel and county concrete road.

Ind. 18—From U. S. 152 north and east over U. S. 152 and county gravel road.

U. S. 24—From Wabash northeast, eastbound traffic, U. S. 24 to Ind. 152 and westbound follow U. S. 24 to Ind. 152 and detour to Wabash. At Roanoke, 1 mile over county gravel road, from East to West, 12 miles over U. S. 31 and Ind. 30 and New Haven street, 2 miles over U. S. 30 and Ind. 31.

Ind. 25—From Rochester to Mentone, 20 miles over Ind. 140 and county gravel road.

Ind. 27—From Ind. 124 east and north, 2 miles over Ind. 124 and county bituminous road.

Ind. 29—From Shelbyville to Indianapolis, 34 miles over U. S. 40 and Indiana 9.

U. S. 31—In Peru and north, 2 miles over city street and county gravel road.

U. S. 6 to South Bend, 29 miles over U. S. 6, Indiana 331 and county concrete road.

Ind. 35—From Ind. 31 and Ind. 60, local traffic can detour north construction over county gravel and U. S. 31.

Indiana 34—From Westmonte to Crawfordsville, 11 miles over county gravel road.

Indiana 55—From Brownsburg east, 4.7 miles over county gravel and bituminous roads.

U. S. 35—East of Danville, shoulder construction, drive carefully. From Indianapolis to Indiana 9, south of Pendleton, 3 miles over U. S. 40 and Indiana 9.

Indiana 39—From Danville to Lebanon, 30 miles over county gravel and bituminous road.

Ind. 34—From Indiana 18 to Delphi, four miles over county gravel and bituminous road.

U. S. 40—From Terre Haute to Indiana 43, 44 miles over U. S. 41, 36 and Indiana 43.

From Cambridge City to East Germantown, construction, drive carefully. East of Cambridge City, two lane traffic through bridge.

Ind. 41—South of Fort Branch, construction, drive carefully. Just north of White River near Hazelton, 5.5 miles over county gravel. Three miles south of Vincennes, bridge run-around. From Cook to U. S. 30, undrained shoulders, drive carefully, truck advised to follow U. S. 30.

Indiana 13 and U. S. 152—From U. S. 30 west and north to U. S. 6, seven miles over U. S. 30 and Indiana 141.

Indiana 43—From Westville to Cambridge City, 14 miles over U. S. 6, county construction and oil mat roads.

Indiana 46—From Bloomington to Nashville, 23 miles over county gravel and bituminous roads. From Danville west and north, five miles over U. S. 36, county gravel and oil mat roads.

Ind. 136—From North Salem southeast four miles over county gravel and bituminous roads. From Danville west and north, five miles over U. S. 36, county gravel and oil mat roads.

Ind. 140—From U. S. 40 to Knightstown, four miles over county gravel road.

U. S. 234—From Magley to Decatur, 8.5 miles over county gravel and brick roads.

Ind. 234—From Ind. 43 east to James-town, 27 miles over Ind. 43 and 34.

Ind. 236—From Ind. 67 east, 8.5 miles over Ind. 67 and county gravel.

Ind. 240—From U. S. 30 east to Mitchell, 17 miles over U. S. 30 and Ind. 37.

Ind. 356—From just west of junction of Ind. 62 north, two miles over county stone road.

Wide Scope of Fans

"Few persons go to hear a Carnegie Hall speaker, but every one will stop to view a good knock-down-and-drag-out fight," declared Mr. Carillo, in comparing the screen's romantics with his own "Curse-of-Jack-Dillon" air.

His public is just as much the boy who slips a greasy dime through a wicket of a neighborhood movie as the intellectuals, he said.

"And I wouldn't be human if I didn't get a little bit more of a kick out of watching a bunch of kids going in a show to see me in a blood-and-thunder quickie than crowds going to some picture for the highbrows," added Mr. Carillo.

On Radio Program

After announcing his next role is to be "The Gay Desperado" he bid goodbye with a sweep of his left hat to feminine passengers he met on the TWA plane bound for New York City.

Indianapolis means to him Booth Tarkington, for he acclaimed the Tarkington play, "Magnolia," in which he played the gambling villain—as the vehicle that provided one of his best parts.

His west-to-east trip by plane is for the purpose of playing with Fay Bainter in "East Is West" over a radio broadcasting network.
