

TIMES-LOEW MOVIE CAST TO GO ON AIR

WIRE Will Broadcast Preview of Picture Now in Making; Whithorne Works to Be Heard

Youngsters to Give Skit From Local Film Tomorrow.

A preview of "It Happened in Indianapolis" is to be broadcast on the Air at 1 tomorrow afternoon. Leading players; the director, technicians and others connected with the Times-Loew's movie will be featured.

Mary Paxton Young and John McGuire, leading players, supported by several other Indianapolis actors and actresses who were cast for supporting roles in "It Happened in Indianapolis," will be heard in a skit from the movie, and Director Leonard A. De Menna will instruct the players as he does on the production lot at Shortridge High School.

Mr. Hickman, who regularly conducts the Magazine of the Air, a radio column of theater and amusements news, will be in charge of the broadcast. Mr. Hickman yesterday interviewed John W. Thompson, the Times' amusements editor, Mr. De Menna, Mark Farrar, manager of Loew's, and Miss Young. WIRE also is to broadcast the opening performance of "It Happened in Indianapolis" at Loew's.

UNCLE SAM, apparently, is a pretty good radio maestro. His two programs, Have You Heard, and Answer Me This, this week move to new NBC spots for better hours and much larger networks. Have You Heard? will be broadcast at 1:45 Tuesday afternoons, beginning today, and NBC-WEAF will air the Answer Me This series at 3:30 Thursday afternoons. Both programs are presented by the Federal Educational Radio Project under the supervision of an advisory committee which includes NBC and government officials. Professional script writers do the continuity, and the programs are written in dialogue. Human interest incidents are woven through the continuity, and many explanations, such as the recent one dealing with tornadoes, are worked out with sound effects.

A good act can't be kept off the air, says Ben Bernie, who for the third time this season will present Ethel Shuttles as his Tuesday evening guest star. Miss Shuttles recently concluded, with her husband, George Olsen, a series of radio programs, and now is resting in California before making a movie. Bernie and all the Lads also are on the coast, and will originate the NBC-WJZ (WLW) program at 7 tonight in the NBC Hollywood studios.

A dance band, unique in that it is organized around an established two-piano team, Fray and Baum, will make its network debut with a program on CBS (WFBN) at 10:30 tonight, and will be heard on CBS each Tuesday and Thursday evening at this hour. Jacques Fray will preside over the musicians from the keyboard of the first piano, and Charles Baum will play the second instrument. Both pianists are known to listeners for their many network programs during the winter. Mr. Fray formerly was the partner of Mario Braggiotti.

Errol Flynn is to be starred in Parties at Pickfair, CBS (WFBN) at 8 tonight, but Hugh Herbert, if he isn't watched, will steal the show. Mr. Herbert, although his role tonight will be a minor one, has the habit of stealing most scenes in which he plays. The theme of Miss Pickfair's current program is "Pirate Night," and she will appear with Mr. Flynn in a skit called "Life on the Spanish Main." Mr. Flynn, who starred in "Captain Blood," is a descendant of Fletcher Christian, who led the famous "Mutiny on the Bounty."

Tonight's Parties at Pickfair is the last to be aired on Tuesday evening, the program changing to Sunday. The network and hour will remain unchanged.

RED NICHOLS accepted an engagement to serve as guest conductor at the Kansas City Travel Show, and received the following instructions: "Since this is a travel exposition, dealing with airplanes, automobiles, motorbuses and railroads, we would prefer that you make the trip by one of these mediums of transportation."

E. Robert Schmitz takes the distinguished contemporary composer, Emerson Whithorne, as the subject of his brief musical monograph at 2 tomorrow afternoon, via CBS-WFBN.

Mr. Schmitz, who usually broadcasts from New York, is to be in Montreal tomorrow, where he is conducting examinations at the Normal School of Music, Montreal University, of which he is director.

"I have arranged this program in order to show the radio audience Whithorne's almost uncanny ability to catch the spirit of the era about which he writes his music," the pianist explained, in choosing for performance two program suites, "New York Days and Nights" and "California Missions."

The first of these, written originally for orchestra, consists of "On the Ferry," "Pell Street," "The Chimes of St. Patrick's," "Greenwich Village Tragedy" and "Times Square." The suite was written in 1923, incorporating jazz rhythms of the day, and was selected to represent American music at the Salzburg Festival that year.

The "California Missions" suite includes "Mission San Juan Capistrano," "The Samarkand Gardens" and "The Fiesta at Monterey."

Mr. Whithorne was born in Cleveland 72 years ago, of a family whose musical activities extend back to sixteenth century England. After seven years in England as music critic for the Pall Mall Gazette, he returned to this country at the beginning of the war, and has devoted the ensuing years to composition. He spends his time between New York and Cape Cod, and listens to jazz records as a means of relaxation from musical creation.

Another full hour of music by Frank Bach's String Symphony on the NBC Blue network at 8 tonight. The familiar Bach A Minor Organ Fugue, transcribed for orchestra, will open the program, to be followed by the seldom heard "Serenade" Suite in E Flat by Wolf-Ferrari, and Miskowski's Sinfonietta.

Wolf-Ferrari is noted chiefly as an opera composer, especially for his "Secret of Suzanne" and the "Jewels of the Madonna." Miskowski, one of the major symphonists of modern Russia, went through an apprenticeship of engineering and art life, like so many other Russian composers, before he finally took up music. He has stated that he does not like Beethoven, detests the music of Bach and Chopin, and worships at the shrine of Tchaikovsky and his Petrograd classmate, Prokofiev.

Virginia and Mary Drane, sister violinists, are to be guests on the NBC Music Guild program at noon tomorrow, on the Red network. They will play Telemann's second "Sonata Polonaise" and Sinding's "Serenade."
