

## CITY SPENDING \$284,446 FOR GOOD STREETS

Alleys, Bridges Also Being Improved Under WPA, Municipal Projects.

The city is spending \$284,446 on street, bridge and alley improvement projects upon which contracts have been let since Jan. 1, Henry B. Steeg, city engineer, announced today.

On some of these construction work now has been completed.

Ten of the 16 street improvements are being carried out under Works Progress Administration grants by which the city provides for the cost of materials and the Federal recovery agency supplies the labor. WPA also is carrying labor costs for the five bridge projects. There are no figures available on amount being spent by WPA for this work, Mr. Steeg said.

Of the total amount, \$260,659.26 is to be spent on streets. Bridge improvements represent an expenditure of \$13,468, and four alleys are being repaired at a cost of \$10,319.49.

### WPA Projects Listed

The 10 WPA street paving projects and their respective costs follow:

Belmont-av., from Oliver-av. to Wyoming-st., \$7,297.10; West Michigan-st., Section "A," from Indiana-av. to Blake-st., \$22,161.18; West Michigan-st., Section "B," from Blake-st. to Limestone-av., \$30,658.50; West Michigan-st., Section "C," from Limestone-av. to White River bridge, \$14,900.90; Noble-st., from Michigan-st. to Massachusetts-av., \$13,322.40; Keystone-av., Section "A," from 30th-st. to 34th-st., \$20,693.25; Keystone-av., Section "B," from 34th-st. to 38th-st., \$18,205.10; Prospect-st., from Keystone-av. to Vandemar-st., \$20,303.90; Ritter-av., Section "A," from Pleasant Run-blvd. to C. C. & St. L. R. R., \$21,705, and Ritter-av., Section "B" from C. C. & St. L. R. R., to Brooklyn-av., \$20,440.55.

The six streets improved or being improved exclusively by the city and their costs are:

Brookside-av., from 1081 feet west of Rural-st. to Rural-st., \$14,832.38; Meridian-st., from Washington-st. to Maryland-st. (completed), \$11,452.50; Sixteenth-st. from Delaware-av. to Alabama-st., \$4424.51; Westfield-blvd., from Pennsylvania-av. to Kessler-blvd. (curb and walk project), \$21,295.29, and Locke-st., from North-st. to Walnut-st., \$8876.80.

### Alley Surfaces Concrete

Lock-st. is the only one of the 15 on which the contract called for asphalt improvement. Contracts for paving with cement.

All four alleys are being paved with concrete. They are the first alley west of Cornelius-av. from 40th-st. to Bernard-st., \$1916.65; first east of Graham-av., from St. Clair-st. to 9th-st., \$1347.66; first east of Walcott-st., from the first alleys south of Southeastern-av. to DeLoach-st., \$3298.45; and first east of Windthop-av., from Fairfield-av. to Washington-st., \$3756.78.

Bridges now undergoing improvements are situated at Villa-av. and Pleasant Run; Illinois-av. at Fall Creek; Northerntown-av. at Fall Creek; and 10th-st. at White River. Improvements on the Raymond-st. bridge at White River were completed early this week and the structure now is open to the traffic.

Edward Perry, park board engineer, announced today that approximately five and three-fourths miles of boulevards are to be added this year to the 53 miles now being maintained by the park department.

### Boulevards Being Extended

The additions are to be two and one-half miles of the Fall Creek-pkwy from Keystone-av. to Millersville, which is expected to be completed by July 15; another two and one-half miles of the same boulevard from Millersville to Baker's Bridge, expected to be finished late this fall, and a section of Pleasant Run-blvd., north drive from Meridian-st. to Bluff-av. to be completed Aug. 1.

The three operations are WPA projects and the surfaces of all three are to consist of treated gravel. Thirty-six miles of treated gravel boulevards in the system now are being oiled. Nine miles in the system are of macadam, and seven miles are surfaced with asphalt.

Work on the Park Board's proposed two-mile Pleasant Run-blvd. project, from Arlington-av. to Shadeland-av. to 56th-st., the cost of which is being borne by the county, already are under construction.

Obstruction of the right-of-way has delayed operations on the two-mile section. The board expects to reach an agreement with the 23 property owners along the proposed route shortly.

### VICE RING SMASHED, LUCIANO, AIDS GUILTY

Dewey to Probe Industry  
Rackets Next.

NEW YORK, June 8.—With the Luciano vice empire smashed in a clean sweep verdict for the state, special rackets prosecutor Thomas E. Dewey today promised an immediate attack on other "grabs," presumably the alleged rackets in industry.

Mr. Dewey snapped the back of the vice ring, which reached \$12,000,000 a year proportions on the \$10 a week it extorted for booking prostitutes; in a jury verdict early yesterday convicting Charles (Lucky) Luciano and eight henchmen on all of 62 counts charging compulsory prostitution.

Luciano, not as lucky today as he was when he survived a gangland ride and earned his nickname, may receive 2 to 20 years on each count—a total of 124 to 1240 years—when he is sentenced June 18 by Justice Philip McCook.

The other eight, David Bettolo, Thomas Pennocchio, Abe Wahman, Ralph Liguori, Benny Spiller, Jesse Jacobs, Meyer Berkman and Jimmy Frederico, are in the same position. Frederico and Pennocchio, fourth offenders, face life sentences in any event. Attorneys for all nine plan to appeal.
