day is to consider a request to

abandon several units of the sew-

to raise funds to complete the

project.

An estimated saving of \$4000 is

needed, city officials contend, to as-

proposed to abolish plans for mac-

adam road and sidewalk to the

plant.

work is to be set up to August, since

many working days have been lost.
