

ACTION STAYED ON REPEAL OF PICKETING LAW

City Council Also Passes
Over Salary Measure,
Trolley Contract.

The City Council last night deferred action on the move to repeal the picketing ordinance, the proposal to eliminate 15 per cent salary cuts for police and firemen and the Indianapolis Railways, Inc., trackless trolley franchise.

The Safety Board for the third time asked for an \$1800 appropriation to pay salaries of merit commission members and to pay cost of four schools for police and fire department candidates.

Completion of repairs on the S. Harding-st sewer were assured by a \$2000 appropriation.

The Council also transferred members of the Gamewell department to the fire department, authorized the sale of park property and decided six city lots to the Indianapolis Water Co.

Disannexing Is Rejected

A proposal to disannex from the city property in N. Meridian-st from 71st-st to Williams Creek was stricken from the file. This section was annexed by the city in 1933 to bring it under the jurisdiction of the City Plan Commission. A suit filed by demonstrators now is pending in Circuit Court.

Upon the recommendation of City Engineer Henry B. Steeg and a motion by Councilman Theodore Cable, the Council appropriated money necessary to complete S. Harding-st sewer repairs from Kentucky-av to the city sanitation plant.

The repairs are being made as a Works Progress Administration project. Approximately one-half of the 4000-foot job has been completed. Mr. Steeg said that five-eighths of the city's sewage passes through this sewer and that it has been in unsatisfactory condition for five years.

Members of the Gamewell division, the fire alarm section of the fire department, in the future are to take their orders from Chief Fred C. Kennedy instead of Thomas E. Haefling, division superintendent. The division previously was under the jurisdiction of the fire chief, but for the last several years had been operated as a separate unit. Members of the division are firemen.

Approves Land Sale

In making the shift it was necessary for the Council to transfer \$7127 to the fire department for salaries for the remainder of the year.

Upon the motion of Councilman Nannette Dowd, the council passed an ordinance authorizing sale by the Park Board of four-tenths of an acre of land on the North Side to C. Miller for \$800. The property is bounded by Kessler-blvd, Ralston- and 56th-st. Edward Perry, board engineer, said the land was of no use to the park department.

Under suspension of rules, the Council voted to give the Indianapolis Water Co. deeds to six lots bounded by Fall Creek, the Canal and 21st-st in exchange for 23 acres of land along the creek on which a levee is being constructed. The lots adjoin the company's filtration plant.

Trolley Contract Held Over

Upon the recommendation of Councilman Cable a discussion of a 20-year trackless trolley contract now before the Council, under which the railway company would pay the city \$324.76 a mile a year for use of the streets over which it operates trolleys, was delayed until the next meeting. In addition to needing ratification by the Council, the contract also must meet with the approval of the Public Service Commission before going into effect.

Proposals to repeal the present picketing ordinance and to restore full salaries to police and firemen, now cut 15 per cent, which have been pending several weeks, were held over without discussion.

Under a state law passed by the 1936 Legislature, candidates for positions in the police and fire departments must pass a course of instruction before being admitted to service. So far under the present administration no new men have been appointed to either department. Thirty-two police and 17 fire department vacancies now exist.

Phone Case Revived

At its last meeting the Council voted \$450 to defray the expenses of the police school now in session. Mayor Kern refused to sign the ordinance and returned it to City Clerk Daniel J. O'Neill Jr. A new ordinance is expected to be acted upon at the next meeting July 6.

Other ordinances prepared by the Safety Board asked for establishing taxicab zones in front of the Harrison and Lockerbie Hotels, and the marking of passenger and loading zones in front of the William H. Rock Co., the Illinois and Markets, the Winter Apartments, 1321 N. Meridian-st, and the Pearson Furniture Co., 32-34 Kentucky-av.

Councilman Cable introduced a resolution asking that the Works Board and the city legal department enter into negotiations with the Indiana Bell Telephone Co. seeking a larger payment by the utility for use of streets and alleys for its wires. The company now pays the city \$6000 annually for the privilege.

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45 LOCAL BOYS TO COMPETE IN COACH BUILDING

Fisher Craftsman's Guild
Offering Prizes for
Best Models.

Forty-five Indianapolis youths have entered the 1936 Fisher Body Craftsman's Guild model coachbuilding competition, for which awards valued at \$50,000 have been posted. It was announced today.

Fourteen are enrolled in the master class. They are to build miniature Napoleonic coaches. Four winners in the class are to receive \$5000 university scholarships.

The others are entered in the apprentice division. They are required to construct simpler traveling coaches of the same period. Sixteen cash awards totaling \$400 are to be distributed to victors in each state.

Competitions are open to boys of from 12 to 19 inclusive, and two age classifications, a junior and a senior, have been established within these

limits. Duplicate awards are to be made to each age group. Closing date is Aug. 1 and judging of the model coaches is to begin immediately thereafter. Local entrants are:
