

## AVIATOR, BRIDE PICK AIR TOUR AS HONEYMOON

Annual All-State Aerial Trip  
Scheduled for Monday  
Start.

Mr. and Mrs. Clarence McElroy, whose nuptial romance began in 1934 during the all-Indiana Air Tour, are to leave Hoosier Airport Monday with the 1936 Air Tour as honeymooners.

Mr. McElroy, manager of the Winamac airport and a pioneer in stunting tri-motored craft, gained national prominence after crashing in a Mexican jungle a year ago. He was lost for 17 days before crawling, with both hips broken, to an Indian reservation.

The air tour, sponsored by the Indiana Aircraft Trades Association, is to cover 1500 miles throughout the state. It is the largest of its kind in the United States and is limited to 50 planes. Thirty pilots have already made application to join the tour.

Project Is to Be Sponsored by



## PURDUE EDUCATOR WINS FELLOWSHIP FOR ATOM RESEARCH

LAFAYETTE, Ind., June 16.—Dr. H. J. Yearian, of the Purdue University physics department, is shown above with some of the experimental apparatus designed to aid his research work.

Dr. Yearian has been awarded a National Research Council fellowship for work on the atom and electron with electronic waves. He also designed

an instrument to measure distribution on photographic plates and, with J. D. Howe, perfected a new universal camera for electron diffraction.

The fellowship award is made on a competitive basis, with only the highest 3 per cent of Ph. D.'s in the country eligible. Two positions were created in the physics division.

Dr. Yearian is to continue his work at the California Institute of Technology, Pasadena, Cal.

## WORKERS PROTEST TARIFF REDUCTIONS

Band Instrument Plant Employees  
Send Telegram to Washington.

ELKHART, Ind., June 16.—An employee committee of W. T. Armstrong Co. band instrument manufacturers, today awaited results of their telegraphed protest against reduction of duties on musical instruments.

A three-page telegram from the employees to Representative Samuel B. Pettingill appealed to the Congressman to protect their jobs, "threatened by the alarming increase in imported musical instruments." The protest was forwarded to the United States Tariff Commission.

## NEW FARE SCHEDULE LISTED BY BUS LINE

Two Cents a Mile Rate Effective to Cincinnati, Madison.

Cuts in bus fares to all points between here and Cincinnati and Madison were placed into effect by the Indianapolis and Southeastern Lines. Will M. Fraze, vice president and general manager, announced.

One way tickets have been reduced one-third, and an additional 10 per cent reduction has been made on round trip tickets. The new fares conform to a 2 cents a mile rate, instead of the 3 cent rate charged heretofore, Mr. Fraze said.
