

\$1000 IS RAISED TO AID CRIPPLED CHILDREN'S UNIT

Rotary Club Subscribes
Fund to Equip Medical
Room at School.

The medical unit of the new James E. Roberts School for Crippled Children is to benefit from \$1000 subscribed by the Indianapolis Rotary Club yesterday.

A request for a contribution of \$800 for equipment for the unit at the weekly luncheon at the Claypool resulted in the subscription. A. Dallas Hitz presented a detailed description of the school's work. The medical unit will eliminate the necessity of transporting the pupils from the school to clinics for examinations, he told the group.

Paul C. Stetson, superintendent of schools and chairman of the club's crippled children committee, announced that the committee had investigated the school's needs and found the medical unit an opportunity for service.

"The quick and generous response of the Rotary Club is deeply gratifying to all interested in the school," Mr. Stetson said. "In equipping the medical unit, the Rotary Club is carrying on its crippled children program in line with the work it already has done at Riley Hospital."

The new school, maintained jointly by the Indianapolis Foundation, the school city and the state, was made possible by the will of Mrs. Henrietta West Roberts, widow of James E. Roberts, a Federal grant of \$90,000 and a \$55,000 school bond issue. It is to be situated at 10th and Oriental-sts.

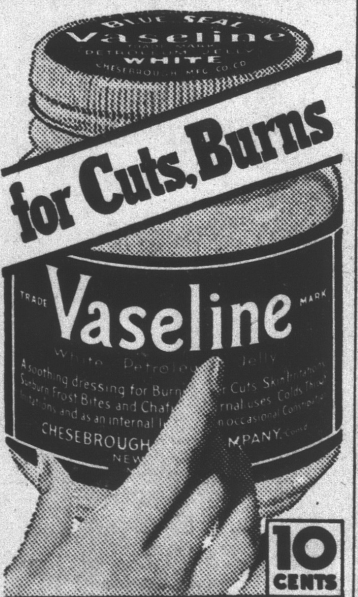
One full credit is to be granted in all classes except the preparatory subjects and typewriting.

The Edwin Ray M. E. Church is to sponsor a fish fry at 5 Saturday night at Finch Park, Fletcher and State-avs.



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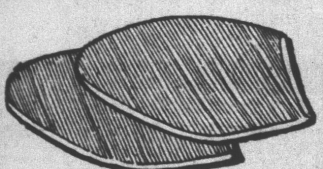
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
