

G.O.P. LEADERS MEET TO STUDY ELECTION PLANS

Candidates' Suggestions to
Be Discussed Today
at Parley Here.

The Republican state committee was to meet today for a luncheon at the Claypool to discuss fall election campaign plans.

The meeting, called by Chairman Ivan Morgan, Austin, was to discuss proposals of party candidates for campaigning in Indiana.

Mr. Morgan held a meeting here recently with G.O.P. nominees to discuss organization plans for the state campaign.

Party leaders report that the Hoosier G.O.P. is to stress precinct, ward and county organization work as one of the best methods of building a machine capable of coping with the Democrats in the November election.

Want Short Campaign.

Organization work is to take up summer months, with actual campaigning by nominees beginning after Labor Day, according to Mr. Morgan.

State committee members said no "shake-up" of charges were planned for today's meeting.

"It's a good idea to organize the campaign," one member said.

Managers of Gov. Alf M. Landen are expected to visit the state within the next few weeks to arrange for the Kansan's race in Indiana against President Roosevelt.

JACKSON CALLS 2 DISTRICT MEETINGS

State Committee Vacancies
to Be Filled.

Omer Stokes Jackson, Democratic state chairman, today called meetings in the Third and Eleventh Congressional Districts to fill vacancies on the state committee.

The Third District meeting, to be presided over by Mr. Jackson, is to be held July 9 in the Oliver Hotel, South Bend. At the reorganization meeting of the state committee in May a deadlock resulted in a declaration of "No election" in the district.

A new rule, adopted by the state committee, does not permit a state chairman to break a tie vote except on the question of adjournment.

The Eleventh District meeting is to be held Tuesday at Democratic state headquarters. A district chairman is to be named to succeed the late Cary Forkner, Anderson.

An exhibit of oils, pastels and water colors, painted last winter under the instruction of William F. Kaeser, PWA art teacher, opened yesterday at the Lyman Gallery, 31 Monumen-

Circle. "Bottles and Plant" (pictured above), painted by Mrs. Maude G. Bennett, was awarded honorable mention. It is considered typical of WPA work.

Mr. Kaeser explained that beginners were forced to remain indoors during the winter, and consequently the first book, vase or plant that came into view soon was painted on canvas.

Several of the 40 pictures exhibited are "still lives." Predominating colors are blue and green.
