

## PROFIT BIG FOR SOUTHWESTERN WHEAT GROWER

Harvested Grain to Bring Highest Return Since 1929.

Editor's Note: The year 1936 promises to become one of the most disastrous drought years in the history of American agriculture. Particularly hard hit and facing financial ruin are the wheat farmers of the northwest. Seeking to learn just what the year's wheat harvest will mean in dollars and cents to agriculture, the United Press consulted market experts whose statistics are the basis for the following article.

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CHICAGO, July 9.—Even with many thousand acres of his crop killed by drought, heat, and insects, the American farmer stands to receive approximately \$603,000,000 for his 1936 wheat crop—and that is more than the nation's wheat has returned in any year since 1929.

Grain statisticians reported today that record high price per bushel would pay farmers the biggest dividends on their wheat in seven years despite the fact that crop-killing weather conditions have cut the prospective yield far below the "bumper" harvests of the past.

Market experts estimated the farm value of this year's crop by multiplying the prospective 600,000-bushel yield, indicated this week in an announcement by President Roosevelt, by the price of the December wheat future, less handling charges, on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Southwest Cashes In

The computation revealed a prospective dollars and cents return to the farmer of \$603,000,000, as compared with the \$569,000,000 the 1935 crop brought; \$416,000,000 received in 1934; \$384,000,000 in 1933; \$282,000,000 in 1932; \$363,000,000 in 1931 and \$365,000,000 in 1930.

In compiling the probable gross farm income from wheat, the statisticians allowed 5½ cents a bushel for handling charges or the price differential between the producer and the wheat pit. December wheat sold at 60.05¢ a bushel on the Board of Trade yesterday. Therefore, \$1.000 was used as the basis for calculating the prospective returns.

Approximately five-sixths of the money will go to winter wheat growers in the Southwest. Most of their crop is harvested, safe from drought or dust storms. Sensational price gains of nearly 25 cents a bushel in as many days on the nation's grain markets have raised the size of the checks the Southwestern wheat farmer gets at the crossroads elevator by 25 per cent. His larger profits should enable him to pay off the mortgage on the old homestead and perhaps buy a new tractor besides.

Northwest Crop Devastated  
In contrast to the rosy outlook for farmers in Kansas, Oklahoma and the Texas Panhandle is the pitiable plight of spring wheat growers in Montana, the Dakotas and parts of Minnesota. Prospects early in the spring were for a bumper crop in the Northwest. Heavy snows left fields with plenty of sub-soil moisture.


But months of unbroken drought and record-breaking temperatures slowly baked the moisture from the once fertile fields until prospective yields were cut by 60 per cent and complete crop failure became certain in many sections.

While winter wheat growers reap a golden harvest from higher wheat prices caused by the drought, farmers in the Northwest will harvest a crop of less than 100,000,000 bushels—140,000,000 bushels under official estimates five weeks ago.

"Of course not all this year's wheat crop will be hauled to market," one crop expert pointed out.

"About 15 per cent, or 90,000,000 bushels, will be held for seed. And it is possible that spring wheat will deteriorate further before harvest is completed. But regardless of the weather from now on the Southwest wheat farmer stands to cash in a tall stack of blue chips in the wheat game."
