

FORMER LOCAL Y. M. SECRETARY DIES IN TOLEDO

Percy B. Williams Engaged in Association Work in Ohio City.

PERCY B. WILLIAMS, former resident of Indianapolis, Butler University graduate and general secretary of the Toledo (O.) Y. M. C. A., died yesterday at his Toledo home after an illness of 18 months. He was 60. Funeral arrangements have not been completed.

Born in Indianapolis, Mr. Williams was a former member of the College Avenue Baptist Church here and a member of the Ashland Baptist Church of Toledo.

ELLIOTT UNLIKE FORMER CHIEF

Acting Controller General Does Not Have Hard-boiled Attitude.

WASHINGTON, July 9.—New Dealers may get a "breathing spell" at the Controller General's office, it appeared today, at least until the President appoints some one equally hard-boiled to succeed John R. McCarl, who retired last week.

For in the interim plump and jovial Richard M. Elliott, former Republican Congressman from Indiana, is acting controller.

Although he has been McCarl's

assistant since 1931, Dick Elliott absorbed not of the "Car of Accounts" attitude of his chief. Having a 15-year appointment from President Hoover, he is removable only by impeachment.

Asked today whether he would adopt a McCarl-like policy, his reply was characteristic of the homespun Hoosierism which made him popular in Congress for nearly 15 years.

"Oh, I'm not carrying out any policies," he said. "I'll just take things as they come and do the best I can."

"All I'll do is act according to law in each instance where I am called on to rule, providing I can find out what the law is, and I hope I can."
