Brief Service to Be Held at Home for Domestic Science Teacher.

MRS. LINA MARKS, Indianapolis resident for 32 years, who died Wednesday at her summer home in Bay View, Mich., is to be buried tomorrow in Crown Hill Cemetery following brief services at 10 a. m. at her home, 3311 N. New Jersey-st.

Mrs. Marks, who was 75, conducted a private domestic science school at her home for 22 years and was honorary president of the Indianapolis Home Economics Club. She studied domestic science at Columbia University.

She was a member of the Central Avenue M. E. Church and its Women's Bible Class.

Survivors are a sister, Mrs. Asbury Strole, Brook; a niece, Mrs. Ruth Weaver, Lima, O.; two nephews, Joseph McCone, Oxford, O., and Joel G. Wilmoth, Indianapolis, and another niece, also living in Ohio. Mrs. Marks' husband, William J. Marks, died in 1925.

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# MOST VETERANS IN INDIANA CASH SERVICE BONDS

383,612 Hoosiers Convert Certificates, Local Records Reveal.

More than 67 per cent of the Indiana veterans who received bonus money have converted them into cash, local records reveal, postmaster, said today.

A report of the U. S. Treasury department yesterday stated that approximately 60 per cent of the nation's veterans who received bonus had cashed them at the close of business July 3.

Of the estimated 73,000 veterans who received their bonus, 49,407 have cashed them and an equal number of checks for the total had been mailed out through the Indianapolis postoffice Wednesday.

Up to Wednesday, 383,612 bonds had been cashed through the local postoffice. This figure represents a clearing of \$19,180,650 in bonus money—nearly 80 per cent of

the estimated share of the bonus money for local veterans certifying in Indianapolis.

For the two weeks beginning June 17, first day of certification, and ending June 30, bonds totaling \$16,900,300 were cashed. During the first week in July, ending Wednesday bonds totaling \$2,250,450 were turned into cash. About 125 veterans a day are certifying their bonds at the bonus room in the Federal building, Mr. Seidensticker said.
