

HARRY PETERS TO BE BURIED IN CROWN HILL

Services for Republican
Scheduled for 10:30
Tomorrow Here.

HARRY T. PETERS, 3263 College-av, for many years active in Republican politics, is to be buried in Crown Hill tomorrow following services at 10:30 a. m. at the Flanner & Buchanan Mortuary. Mr. Peters, who was 70, died in his home Sunday.

He was born in Cambridge and came to this city when a young man. He was employed by the American Express Co. 41 years, and for six years in the office of secretary of state.

He was associated with the State Insurance Commission from 1871 to 1933. He was a Mason and an Elk. Survivors are the widow and two sons, Harry R. Peters, Indianapolis, and Bruce L. Peters, Cambridge City.

WILLIAM B. DORSEY, Pennsylvania Railroad engineer for 41 years, who died Sunday in his home, 254 N. Arsenal-av, is to be buried tomorrow following services at 10 in the Pinn Brothers Funeral Home. He was 82.

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ANTI-NEW DEAL WOMEN GATHER TO AID LONDON

Indiana Division of the
Independent Coalition to
Be Organized.

More than 100 women were assembled at the Hotel Lincoln today to organize an Indiana division of the Independent Coalition of American Women, an anti-New Deal organization pledged to support Alfred M. Landon for President.

The meeting was to be under the direction of Mrs. Kin Hubbard, national vice-chairman and temporary state chairman, and Mrs. Mabel Jacques Eichel, New York, national director. The Coalition was established as a national movement in Toledo June 30.

Divisions have been established in seven states and temporary committees have been set up in three others, leaders said. State units include Connecticut, Rhode Island, Kentucky, Pennsylvania, New York, Ohio and Michigan.

"We hope to enroll a million women and we are asking each one to bring between five and 25 persons to the polls Nov. 1 to support the election of Gov. Landon," Mrs. Eichel, who arrived yesterday.

"We are appealing to all women, regardless of party affiliation. We want the interest of those who have never gone to the polls before."

The meeting was scheduled to start at 10 o'clock. A luncheon was to follow.
