

HARRY PETERS TO BE BURIED IN CROWN HILL

Services for Republican
Scheduled for 10:30
Tomorrow Here.

HARRY T. PETERS, 3263 College, av. for many years active in Republican politics, is to be buried in Crown Hill tomorrow following services at 10:30 a. m. at the Flanner & Buchanan Mortuary. Mr. Peters, who was 70, died in his home Sunday.

He was born in Cambridge and came to this city when a young man. He was employed by the American Express Co. 41 years, and for six years in the office of secretary of state.

He was associated with the State Insurance Commission from 1931 to 1933. He was a Mason and an Elk. Survivors are the widow and two sons, Harry R. Peters, Indianapolis, and Bruce L. Peters, Cambridge City.

WILLIAM B. DORSEY, Pennsylvania Railroad engineer for 41 years, who died Sunday in his home, 254 N. Arsenal-av., is to be buried tomorrow following services at 10 in the Flanner Brothers Funeral Home. He was 82.
