Wipe Fingerprints From Strong Box; Get \$215 at Kautz Store.

While Pontiac police were investigating, Mr. Virt disappeared. They are holding the truck tractor.



No. 4, Box 525, shoveling winter feed into baskets preparatory to the evening feeding of his beef herd. No. 3 shows a beautiful tassle on corn, but indicates to the expert that that corn never will mature. The sun has cooked the life out of the pollen.

age puddle for a fresh drink. They were eating prepared meal, instead of grass.

"Last year," Mr. Murphy said, "I had a pretty good year. Last winter I sat around the fire and read. I even had four porterhouse steaks I got at King's."

"But this year! Well, there's my whole year's work. Those cattle—they weigh 850 each now. I'll have them at 1100 before I sell. I usually sell within the first two weeks in December. But they'll be sold before two months are out."

Production Cost Too High
"It's costing me more to produce a pound of beef than I'll ever get for it. If I could get 11 or 12 cents a pound I'd make out all right. I have no choice but to sell."

"Every one has the same idea, to sell. If you want to do something smart you want to do it when no one else is doing it."

Mr. Murphy has 63 acres in pasture, 40 acres in wheat, 20 of which was badly winter-killed; 75 acres of corn. The wheat was pretty good, the oats better than most. He's holding all of it to see what happens.

Corn Cut for Cattle
Out in the barn lot was a wagon bed half loaded with cut, immature corn. At 6 it was to be hauled into the cattle yard and tossed to the cattle.

SLAKE ESCAPES IN COURTROOM

Chamber in Bedlam Until Four-Foot Rattler Is Recaptured.

LOS ANGELES, July 15.—The rattlesnake he is accused of using to torture his seventh wife safely back in its box, Robert S. James, red-haired "Bluebeard" barber, again today took the stand to deny he killed his bride when the snake venom failed to act.

The diamond-backed rattler, four feet long, took the limelight from James when it wriggled from the hands of A. Pierce Artram, a snake expert, who was examining its fangs.

Some one yelled, "He's loose," and in an instant the courtroom was a bedlam. Women shrieked. Lawyers and court attendants yelled and rushed for exits.

Mr. Artram, visibly embarrassed, poked a forked stick under a bookcase where the snake, "Lethal," hissed defiance. He captured the reptile, returned it to its box and the spectators and participants in the trial cautiously came back.

The snake had slipped across the

floor within the enclosure where participants in the trial. James, unmoved, watched it coolly. He half smiled.

Charles H. Hope, the ex-mayor who confessed and charged James with the murder of his young bride, paled when the snake slithered across the floor near him. Like others within the railing, he started moving and returned only when the hissing reptile was coiled with "Lightning," the other snake exhibit.

The barber went to the stand to start his denial, point by point, of Hope's charges that he plotted his wife's death, shoved her foot into the box containing the rattler and finally drowned her in a bathtub.


