

HOME OF RILEY ADDED TO PARK AT GREENFIELD

Purchase of Indiana Poet's
Residence Made by
City Council.

GREENFIELD, Ind., July 17.—The City of Greenfield has bought the home of James Whitcomb Riley and has added it to Riley Memorial Park.

Purchase, made possible by a city ordinance, was announced yesterday by Mayor James L. Allen. The price was \$3500.

The city park board is to maintain the property but restoration to its original state is to be undertaken by the Riley Old Home Society with assistance of civic, literary, social and historical clubs.

Born in Log Cabin

Riley, the poet, was born in a log cabin on the site of the present Riley home on Oct. 7, 1849. When he was a month old the family moved into the present home and lived there until Capt. Rouben Riley, father, returned from war. The property had been acquired by Riley in 1846.

Eventually the property passed from the hands of the poet's family. In 1909, Riley purchased it, furnished it, and made it a home for his brother, John A. Riley, who lived there until his death. Until last summer, his widow retained the house as her home but gave it up to live in California.

The Riley heirs agreed to sell the property only on the condition that it would always remain in the custody of the city and the provision was incorporated in the ordinance for purchase.

Interesting Features

Interesting features of the old home are the beautiful old walnut stairs in the reception room built by Capt. Riley, a man skilled in the use of tools; the side porch where Orphan Annie "shooed the chickens" and "brushed the crumbs away"; the "cubby hole and press" where the parents searched for the little boy who wouldn't say his prayers in the poem, "The Goblins' Oh You if You Don't Watch Out." Restoration is to start at once.

Riley Memorial Park now includes the Riley home, the Ol' Swimmin' Hole, the Brandywine and other haunts of the beloved Indiana poet.

YEGGMEN LOOT SAFE OF CHARITY SOCIETY

Steal \$1338 From Family
Welfare's Strongbox.

Yeggs cracked the safe at the Family Welfare Society offices, 333 N. Pennsylvania-st last night and took \$1338.

Miss Louis Kiersted, Spink Arms Hotel clerk in charge of the welfare headquarters, said that entry was gained by forcing the front door and the safe combination was apparently knocked off with a hammer and punch. The loss was covered fully by insurance, she said.

Detectives said the method of opening the safe was the same used by two yeggmens who have been operating in Indianapolis since the first of the year. Detectives sought fingerprints on the safe and about the premises. The safe was located on the second floor.

when William Mahan, official court reporter, took the witness stand.

Mr. Mahan wrote the questions and his own answers into the record as he testified he had taken in shorthand a confession from Haygood, April 24, in the Indianapolis Athletic Club.

Judge Cox said he would confer with the attorneys this morning about instructions to the jury and the closing arguments, two and a half hours to each side, were to begin at 1 this afternoon.

Due to inadequate overnight accommodations for women jurors in the Courthouse, Judge Cox said he would delay giving his one and a half hour final instructions until 9 Saturday morning.

W. C. Smith, owner of the Indiana Film Transfer Co., testified he signed a contract with the union after several of his trucks were stoned.

On cross examination Mr. Smith testified he did not like the union and had been cited once by the NRA authorities for alleged overtime working of his drivers.

Mrs. Marjorie White, firm general manager, testified that Peats and Williams threatened to have the trucks stoned unless a closed shop contract was signed.

A fragment of rock he claimed he found on a ledge in the Penny truck was described by Sheriff Albert Shane of Hendricks County. He said he saw a large stone with "dark red stains" on it 35 feet from the truck the morning following the alleged stoning.

He said that he searched the field into which the truck careened that night with a flash light without discovering any missiles, and that Kroger officials picked up some rocks from the road the next morning and removed them from the county.

Albert S. Johnson, Fletcher Trust Co. handwriting expert, testified that neither Peats nor Williams had signed their names as written on a letter and envelope alleged to have been sent to Penny. The letter asked Penny to pay his union dues.

Fred Rentschler, a nonunion truck driver, testified on rebuttal that Haygood, Crickmore, Mr. Peats' father, William Peats, and a union man named Kansas City Louis beat him up near Pleasant Gardens, Ind., Sept. 20, 1934.

"Harry Peats told me that if I did not join the union I would get some hot lead and would never arrive in Indianapolis," Rentschler said.

FEWER PERMITS ARE ISSUED FOR CONSTRUCTION

Building and Repairs Worth
\$398,233 Now Being
Made in City.

Building slowed up during the last week of hot weather, Building Commissioner George Popp's records showed today.

More than 200 permits have been issued during the month for a valuation of \$398,233, increasing to 2475 the total jobs of building and repairing already this year.

Valuation on work during July last year was only \$139,376. Seventeen dwellings have been started this month, with valuation of approximately \$107,300.

Only 102 permits were issued during the last week, compared with 137 during a corresponding period in June. Repairs and alterations valued at \$25,345 are being made this month, and new signs valued at \$10,800 have been erected.

Robert Chupp Given Scholarship to University of Louisville.

Robert Chupp of Indianapolis, Franklin College graduate, has been awarded a scholarship at the University of Louisville, where he is to continue his studies next year.

DOOMED WOMAN, IN COMA, DIES IN CHAIR

Mrs. Creighton and Lover
Executed for Crime.

OSHING, N. Y., July 17.—Mrs. Mary Frances Creighton died in the electric chair last night without ever seeing the death chamber.

The woman who had poisoned another woman and delivered her own 15-year-old daughter to a lover who had tired of her, fainted of fright 30 minutes before she was executed. She rode to death in a wheel chair, unconscious, and felt nothing when 2000 volts of electricity ended her life.

Nine minutes later her former lover, Everett Applegate, met the same fate.

They had been convicted of murdering Applegate's 300-pound wife, so that Applegate might marry Mrs. Creighton's daughter, Ruth.
