

'Hollywood Hotel,' Aided by Film Stars, Is to Broadcast Condensed Version of Popular Novel, 'Anthony Adverse'

Helen Vinson Is Scheduled to Visit Frank Fay's Microphone.

"Anthony Adverse" has been condensed alarmingly. First they boiled down Hervey Allen's massive best seller to movie length, and now the story's highlights are to be presented during part of the "Hollywood Hotel" broadcast at 7 o'clock tonight, on WFDM.

According to advance information, Fredric March, who had the picture's title role, will not play in the radio version, but Olivia de Havilland, Staff Duna, Claude Rains, Donald Woods and Gail Sondergaard are to be at the microphone. Dick Powell, singing master of ceremonies, supported by regular members of the cast, is to be heard as usual.

Since movie stars get frequent mention at heads of radio columns, we may as well relate here that Helen Vinson will be on WLW at 6:30 o'clock tonight, as guest of Frank Fay. Miss Vinson is not slated to appear as her cinematic self, but rather as the wife of Fred Perry, world's top-ranking tennis amateur. She arrived from Europe this week, and is expected to tell Mr. Fay and his audience just how her husband defeated Germany's Baron von Gamm at Wimbledon. Her host, incidentally, is quite a tennis player himself, having defeated many worthy opponents.

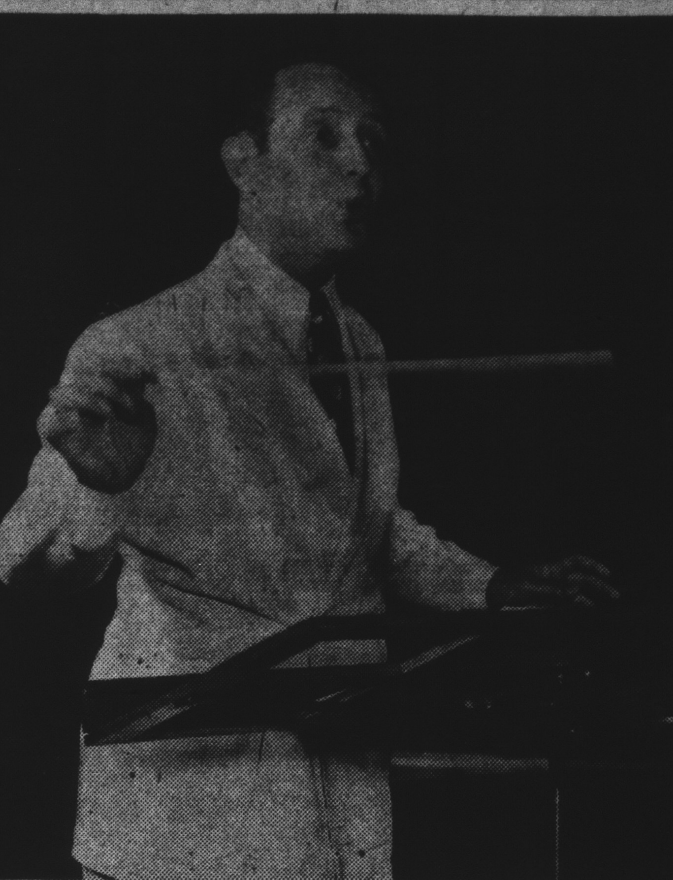
Mrs. Rudyard Kipling in Hospital Where Husband Died.

LONDON, July 17.—Mrs. Rudyard Kipling, 70, was in Middlesex Hospital today with an illness which has not yet been diagnosed. She lies in the same wing of the hospital where her husband, the famous poet and novelist, died last January.

Spelzer, counsel for the plaintiffs: "We are filing legal complaints against evils which seem to have increased steadily. The position of these artists has become intolerable insofar as it compels them to compete with themselves."

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COUNTY NEEDS NEW BUILDINGS, OFFICIAL SAYS

Extreme Heat Emphasized Necessity of Changes, Is Conclusion.

The 10-day heat wave, which caused extreme discomfort to inmates of Marion County institutions, focused attention on need for new buildings and equipment at these homes and hospitals, County Commissioner Clarence J. Wheatley said today.

There were 12 deaths in the last two weeks at the County Infirmary, and heat was a primary or contributory cause in almost every case, he declared.

Located on Tibbs-av north of 16th-st, the building is old and not large enough, Mr. Wheatley said.

"While every effort is made to provide for comfort of these old people, they could be housed better at Julietta Hospital," he added. "We want the state to care for patients now in that hospital and move the poor farm out there."

"Marion County is the only coun-

ty in the United States that maintains a separate home for feeble-minded. While Julietta Hospital, located on Brookville-rd, is old, it is in better condition than some other county institutions."

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
