

Dr. Dafoe Is to Discuss Private Life of Quins in WIRE Broadcast; Theater to Present Miss Colbert, Mr. Huston

Famous Pair to Appear in 'The Barker' in WFBM Presentation.

Why windows of the Dionne nursery were replaced with shatter-proof glass, what happens when Yvonne refuses her porridge, how the five youngsters' proclivity for hurling building blocks was curbed—these and many more anecdotes are to be heard when Dr. Allan Roy Dafoe makes his second guest appearance on the Contended Hour program at 8 o'clock tonight over WIRE.

Besides being one of the world's most famous and remarkable physicians, Dr. Dafoe seems to know what is most interesting to the public about his five charges. In the flood of letters that followed his first broadcast, writers nearly always stated he had answered exactly the questions that interested them.

For an authentic musical background to the doctor's informal talk, the program's usual lullaby will be replaced by five little girls singing a French folk song, "Frere Jacques," which is to be taught soon to the quintuplets. Completing the program will be a quartet and orchestra directed by Morgan L. Eastman, and Opal Craven and Cyril Pitts, soloists.

"The Barker," caustic cross-section of carnival life, will be the vehicle which will bring Claudette Colbert and Walter Huston to the microphone tonight as stars of the radio Theater at 7 o'clock over WFBM.

Neither player is a stranger to this popular play, which was done here by the Federal Players last spring. London saw Miss Colbert in the stage version before she appeared in its film adaptation, and Mr. Huston played it on the New York stage.

Cecil B. DeMille, who seems to have a penchant for presenting "rival" Hollywood directors on these programs, is to interview King Vidor tonight.

World traveler as well as coloratura soprano, 22-year-old Jean Dickenson plans to settle down to become a radio artist and perhaps an opera star as well. Miss Dickenson is the daughter of a mining engineer. She was born in Montreal while her family was en route from Alaska to India. It wasn't until they settled temporarily in Denver after Jean had graduated from a San Francisco high school that her voice was discovered.

She attracted the attention of Lily Pons by her unusually high voice, which easily reaches the G above high C. She is now in the East to begin a new weekly NBC series tonight. She will be heard on the Blue network at 6 p. m. this evening and every Monday, and at 12:30 p. m. Wednesdays over the same network. An orchestra directed by Joseph Littau will accompany both series.

Thanks to radio, American listeners may "look through the window" at European music festivals which annually attract thousands of tourists.

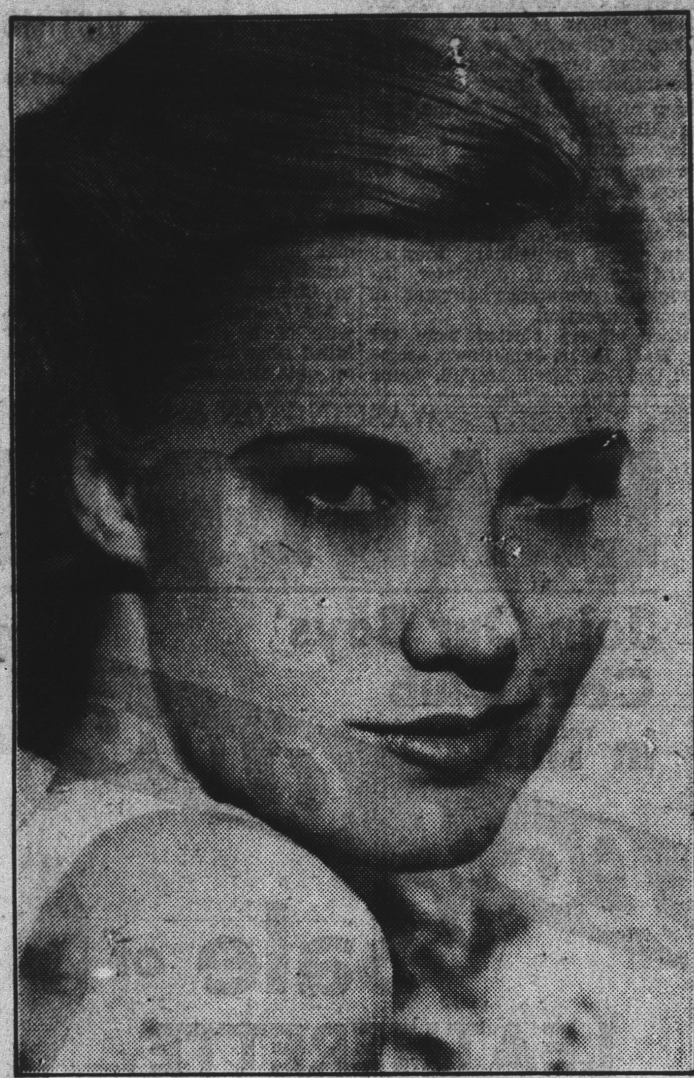
In a program to be relayed from the Linz (Austria) Bruckner Festival by WJZ (660) and the NBC-Blue network at 1:15 p. m. tomorrow, Bruno Walter will conduct the Vienna Philharmonic Orchestra in a performance of the Bruckner Eighth Symphony. Mr. Walter, well known in this country as a former conductor of the New York Philharmonic-Symphony Orchestra, also is scheduled to be heard through NBC a week from tomorrow when he conducts a performance of Mozart's "Don Giovanni" at Salzburg. The Bruckner Eighth Symphony generally is considered to be among his greatest. Controversy still rages about the music of this peasant-genius; more in Europe than America, although New York has its Bruckner Society. The uneven quality of his composition doubtless has much to do with it, though politics played a larger part.

Bruckner, the humble, grotesque-looking school teacher, became embroiled in the bitter Wagner-Brahms-Hanslick quarrel almost unconsciously. A devout admirer of Wagner, Bruckner was pitted against Brahms in the field of symphonic music by the Wagnerians. Hanslick, the Vienna critic and Brahms' ardent supporter, trained his guns on both Wagner and his disciple. And the battle raged.

The symphony scheduled for tomorrow's broadcast is of unusual length, and was five years in the making. Begun in 1885, it was completed in 1890 and first played two years later in Vienna under Hans Richter.

Even Hanslick, although he gave the work a scathing review, admitted its success. "How was the new symphony received?" he wrote. "Boisterous rejoicing, waving of handkerchiefs from those standing, innumerable recalls, laurel wreaths." The orchestra required for the work's performance rivals in size those massive ensembles for which

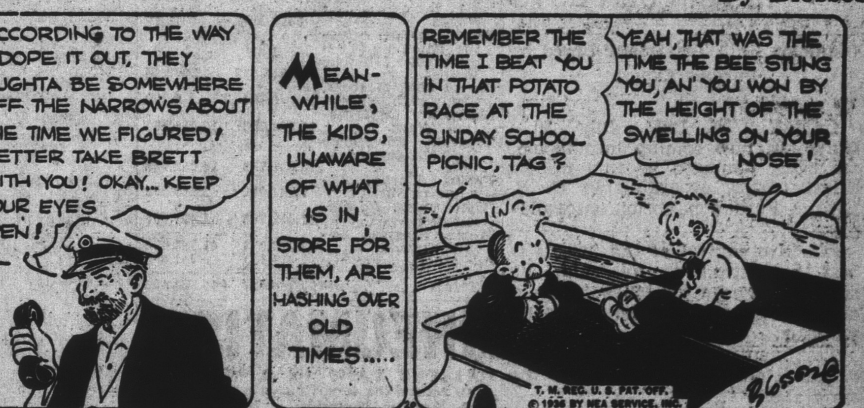

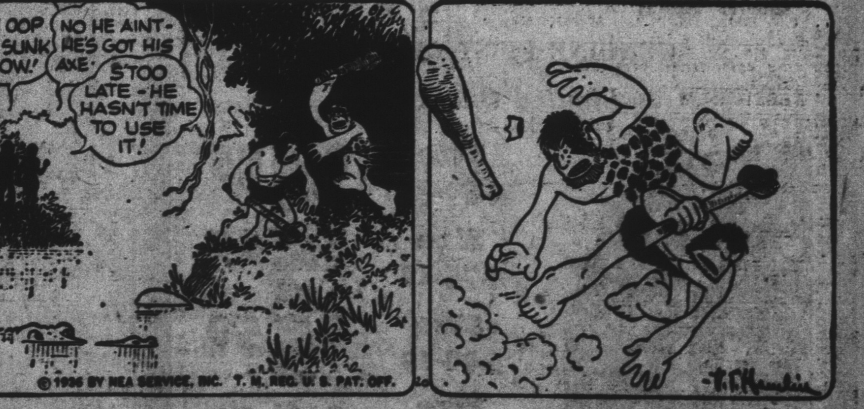

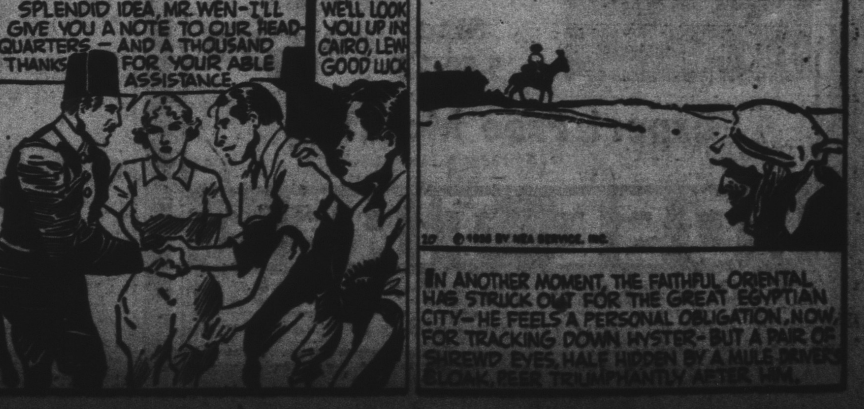
