

28 ARRESTED IN GAMBLING, LIQUOR RAIDS

Defendants Are to Be Given Hearings Today in Municipal Court.

Twenty-eight persons were arrested over the week-end in police raids. Twenty-six of the arrests were on liquor charges, Municipal Court dockets showed today. The other two were on a gaming count.

Twenty-two were slated Saturday and six yesterday. Most of the defendants are expected to have hearings today before Municipal Court judges.

Police claimed they seized 185 bottles of beer at the home of Mickey Pardo, 1002 S. Capitol-av, arresting Pardo and three other men on charges of violating the state liquor law.

Emmett Bailey, Negro, 28, of 1220 E. 16th-st, was arrested on the same charge following a raid yesterday at his home. Leo Sweet, 34, of 1031 English-av, also was charged with liquor law violation after police claimed they found him serving beer in his tavern at 1262 W. Washington-st yesterday.

Claim Beer Confiscated
Charles Shugart, 65, of 787 Fletcher-av, was arrested at that address on a charge of violating the liquor control act. Police reported that 50 pints of beer were confiscated, and five other persons in the establishment were held on vagrancy charges.

Minnie Wilson, Negro, 27, of 421 W. 14th-st, was arrested in a raid at 1159 Patterson-st, Saturday. Police said they found 12 quarts of home brew and a small quantity of alcohol. They charged her with liquor law violation.

In a raid on a poolroom at 420 W. North-st Saturday police arrested Otis Johnson, Negro, 37, of 422 W. North-st, the proprietor, on charges of keeping a gaming house and gambling. Irene Haggard, Negro, 39, of the same address, was arrested on charges of interfering with an officer and operating a gift enterprise.

Others Arrested
A raid at the same time on a poolroom at 332 Shelby-st resulted in the arrest of Dale Gillespie, 1333 Spann-av, on charges of violating the liquor act. Police said more than 100 pints of beer were confiscated.

Humphrey Cummings, Negro, 40, and Rosie Peters, Negro, 32, were charged with violating the liquor law following a Saturday evening raid at 625 Roanoke-st. Three white men found there were charged with drunkenness. Salathiel Pierson, 55, and Rose Bird, 44, were charged with violating the liquor act after a raid Saturday at 710 Lexington-av. Sixty-three pints of beer were alleged to have been confiscated. Two other persons were held for vagrancy.

Mrs. Mary Marco, 531 W. Pearl-st, was charged with violating the liquor control act following a raid Saturday night at her home. Two other persons were slated for vagrancy, and police said they confiscated a dozen bottles of beer and two ounces of whiskey.

**SPRAYING ADVISED
IN WAR ON PESTS**
Gladolus Bulb Treatment Urged by Purdue Expert

LAFAYETTE, Ind., July 20.—Gladolus, now coming into bloom, are being damaged by tiny insects called thrips, according to C. E. Leher, Purdue extension entomologist. Effective control of the insects is best accomplished, he said, by spraying or treating bulbs with a chemical solution just before spring planting. Treatment may also be given after the gladolus have reached the stalk stage. Mr. Leher advised a mixture of two teaspoonfuls of paris green and two pounds of brown sugar in three gallons of water, applied as a fine, forceful mist.

RELIEF OUTLAYS TOP 90 MILLION

\$72,153,159 Actually Spent in State During Year, Manion Says.

During the fiscal year which ended June 30, Federal agencies in Indiana incurred obligations totalling \$90,708,637 out of funds provided by the Emergency Relief Appropriation Act of 1935, Clarence Manion, state NREO director, announced today.

However, on the basis of checks issued by the government, total expenditures were only \$72,153,159 as of that date, he said.

Allocations approved by President Roosevelt for all agencies operating in Indiana totalled \$92,540,337. At the end of the fiscal year, various agencies had unobligated balances of \$1,831,650 and unexpended balances totalling \$20,387,127, Mr. Manion said.

He explained that the \$90,708,637 in obligations consist of actual and accruing liabilities or commitments incurred by project managers or other authorized administrative officers, even though the actual expenditures will not be made, in some instances, for several months.

The WPA, which gave employment to 85,000 at the peak of operations and is now employing nearly 70,000, had obligations of \$43,318,575 on June 30 and actual expenditures of \$1,783,476.

CAREER OF OLD RAILROAD ENDS

Tracks Being Removed on Narrow Gauge Section of Monon Branch.

BLOOMFIELD, Ind., July 20.—Workmen today were putting an end to the career of one of Indiana's oldest railroads—the Bedford and Bloomfield narrow gauge section of the Monon.

Permission was obtained recently from the Public Service Commission to abandon the line that several years ago carried much of the stone from the Bedford limestone district.

Until four years ago, the railway, in order to maintain its franchise, ran a locomotive over the track once a week.

Extending as far west as Switz City and crossing White River at Bloomfield, the road was one of the few in the state to pass through a tunnel of any size.

Ties and steel have been removed from the tunnel at Owensburg, and removal of the track between Bloomfield and Owensburg is expected to be completed within a few days.
