

MCARL OFFERS ECONOMY PLAN IN GOVERNMENT

Two-Point Program Outlined to Reduce Federal Expenditures.

WASHINGTON, July 22.—Former Controller General John R. McCarl, who for 15 years was the "watchdog" of the Treasury, today outlined a two-point program to reduce Federal expenditures along "non-revolutionary" lines.

He advocated use of the presidential office as a "persuasive" force to keep congressional appropriations within "reasonable limits" and drastic economies in administrative costs of bureaus and departments.

Mr. McCarl warned that the nation is headed for trouble unless "brakes" are applied on needless expenditures. He said Gov. Alf M. Landon, Republican presidential nominee, with whom he conferred recently at Topeka, Kas., saw eye to eye with him on the economy program.

Seated behind a flat-top desk in his down-town law office, the gray-haired McCarl said the psychological effect of his former job probably had saved the government billions of dollars.

The former Nebraskan said that the improperly spent funds, which were recovered for the government, would be "infinitesimal" compared with other expenditures had not his office been operating.

Mr. McCarl said he had some "ideas" about his future activities but that he was not ready to disclose them for a "few days."

DIONNES FACE MILK SUPPLY SHORTAGE

Three Family Cows Die After Drinking Poison Solution

CALLANDER, Ont., July 22.—Death of three cows from poisoning has curtailed the supply of milk for the Dionne family.

The cows died after drinking from a barrel containing a saline solution for tempering dill.

Olivia Dionne, father of the famous quintuplets, found the cows dying near his home yesterday.

The 12 remaining cows in his herd, Dionne said, produced insufficient milk for even one meal daily.

Dr. J. E. J. Joyal, who delivered the Dionnes' eleven children July 9, said both the boy and Mrs. Dionne were in "splendid" health. Mrs. Dionne is now able to leave her bed for short periods daily, he said.

OHIO PHONE REFUND ORDERED BY COURT

State Supreme Tribunal Decision Involves \$11,832,264 in 40 Cities.

COLUMBUS, O., July 22.—The Ohio Supreme Court today ordered the Ohio Bell Telephone Co. to refund \$11,832,264 to its customers.

The decision in the 12-year-old case was unanimous except that Judge Thomas A. Jones did not participate.

Forty cities and towns in the state are affected by the decision, including all the larger cities except Cincinnati.

The \$11,832,264 refund does not include interest. The refund sum is under bond, and no provision for interest has been made. A further court action over interest was considered likely.

Blood Found on Broken Door Window at Kresge Building.

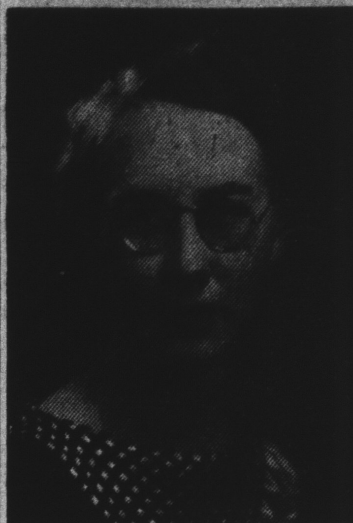

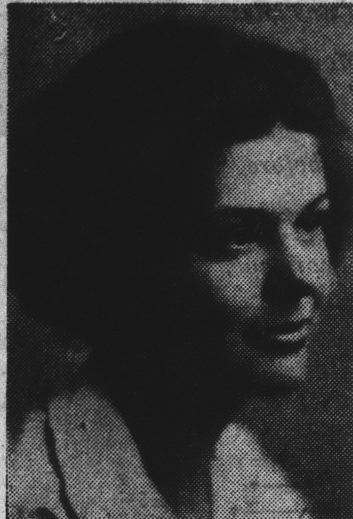

FCC MAY ORDER NEW BROADCAST FREQUENCY LIST

Conference at Washington to Discuss Sweeping Radio Changes.

WASHINGTON, July 22.—At conferences starting here Oct. 5 the Federal Communications Commission will consider reallocation of the entire broadcasting band.

The most sweeping changes in broadcasting since 1928 are in prospect.

The last Congress repealed all limitations on the commission's discretion in allocating wave lengths. Earlier law had required that allocations be made equally among specified zones. By these restrictions Congress had intended to prevent concentration of broadcasting stations in large cities. They worked the other way, and now the communications commission intends to look for some other approach to the problem of giving sparsely settled territory a better break.

One possibility centers about the applications of eight stations for in-

crease in power to 500 kilowatts. WLW, Cincinnati, is now operating on this basis and can be heard in most parts of the United States. WZZ in New York, WGN in Chicago, KDKA in Pittsburgh, and stations in Detroit, Los Angeles, Nashville, Louisville and Des Moines want equal power.

This raises the question whether a few large and powerful stations are better as a national policy—particularly for the sparsely settled areas now getting inferior programs or none at all—than numerous small stations.

The possibility of widening the broadcasting band will be considered also. It now extends from 550 to 1600 kilocycles. Proposals have been made that it extend from 520 to 1800.

Shipping interests are protesting that extension of broadcasting below 550 kilocycles would interfere with SOS calls, now sent at 500. At the other end of the band a change would probably eliminate current experiments in broadcasting high-fidelity programs.

13 More Channels Possible
If both expansions were decided on, 13 more channels would be available.

All broadcasting engineers in the country have been invited to the Oct. 5 conference to give their views.

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on the present setup and suggest improvements.

It probably will take the commission a year to work out new allocations, and perhaps another year to put them into effect. Stations operate under six-month licenses and the commission probably will give this much warning to any which it may contemplate taking off the air. This would give an opportunity for sales of equipment and good will.

The question of issuing licenses

for longer periods may also be taken up. Stations have contended that the necessity of renewing their licenses twice a year constitutes a form of censorship.

Farm Bureau Sales Increase Brings Report.

A "substantial improvement" in the condition of Indiana farmers during the first six months of 1936 is reflected in sales increases reported by the Indiana Farm Bureau Co-operative Association, I. H. Hull, general manager, said today. "Recently Hoosier farmers have been very much interested in the development of motor engineering as applied to farm tractors," Mr. Hull said.

The Co-operative Association has just scheduled 62 tractor demonstrations throughout Indiana in order to educate the farmers to the advantages of high compression motors in tractor farming.

Mr. Hull said he anticipated that farmers in state drought areas would be compelled to curtail their purchases later in the year.
