

M'NUTT SPEECH DRAWS ATTACK BY I. C. MORGAN

Governor Has Reversed His
Stand on Hearst, G. O.
P. Aid Says.

The radio address of Gov. Paul V. McNutt attacking William Randolph Hearst's support of the Republican presidential candidate places the Hoosier executive in a complete reversal of his position four years ago, according to Ivan C. Morgan, Republican state chairman.

Gov. McNutt said in answer: "Anything that Mr. Morgan says or does is not now, and never has been, of any interest to me. The disagreements and rifts in the Democratic Party are nothing compared with those in the Republican ranks."

Asked if he thought the Democratic National Committee had handed him a "hot potato," Mr. McNutt replied: "No."

McNutt singled out Hearst for bitter criticism Tuesday night in a radio broadcast attacking the " sinister interests" backing Gov. Alf Landon of Kansas.

"It is possible that the Governor has forgotten that Mr. Hearst supported President Roosevelt in the presidential campaign of four years ago."

Recalls Shift in Support

Morgan recalled that a shift in Hearst support made possible the nomination of the Roosevelt-Garner ticket and left McNutt's state organization without Federal patronage.

Mr. Morgan indicated that he believed the Indiana Governor was handed the address by New Deal publicity writers with orders to "deliver it or else."

"Opponents of the New Deal, and even foes of the Governor, within his own party, seldom have accused him of being politically dumb, and that makes all the more difficult a logical explanation of the McNutt radio broadcast," Mr. Morgan charged.

Increased Taxes, Charge

"If we are wrong in assuming that Gov. McNutt was not handed his Hearst speech from Democratic National Headquarters with orders to deliver it, we point to the fact that Mr. McNutt has refused to divulge the source of the manuscript," Mr. Morgan added.

The Republican chairman concluded with a suggestion that McNutt confine himself to state issues in the fall campaign and accused the state administration of "playing politics with the liquor law," increasing taxes and offering a gubernatorial candidate unqualified for the job.

EX-TOWNSEND AID
DENOUNCES LEADER

"False" to Followers Is Charge Made
by R. E. Clements Here.

"The principles of the Townsend plan, of necessity, will become operative in this country," Clements added.

TAX LIMIT LAW
UNDER ATTACK

Crown Point Mayor Raps
Provision on Extra
Appropriations.

W. Vincent Youkey, Mayor of Crown Point, was on record today in opposition to the law requiring cities and towns to get approval of the State Board of Tax Commissioners for appropriations outside the regular budget.

Mayor Youkey spoke at a regional meeting of the Indiana Municipal League in the Indianapolis Athletic Club yesterday before 30 Mayors and officials of Anderson, Lebanon, Connersville, Lawrence, Beech Grove, Noblesville, Parker and Indianapolis. Mayor Kern was host.

"The Municipal League is preparing a legislative program, one aim of which will be the repeal of the tax law sections that require municipalities to run to the state board whenever they need additional appropriations," Mayor Youkey said.

"Now we may have an appropriation passed by a City Council, advertised in the newspapers and without opposition of any citizen. Yet we must go to the State Tax Board and get its consent before we can have the money. We believe that the cities and towns are able to run their own affairs to a greater extent than the law at the present provides."

M. R. Keefe, chief engineer of the State Highway Department, discussed the Indiana gasoline tax law and the state-wide highway survey.

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DETROIT STRONG FOR ROOSEVELT, FARLEY IS TOLD

Given Good Chance to Win
in Michigan, Louisiana,
Observers Say.

NEW YORK, July 23.—President Roosevelt has better than an even chance of winning Michigan's votes in the coming election and will have little trouble in obtaining a majority in Louisiana, two official visitors at Democratic headquarters said here yesterday.

Calling on National Chairman James A. Farley while en route to Washington, Frank Murphy, former Governor General of the Philippine Islands who was given a leave of absence to run for Governor of Michigan, said that the workers of

Detroit are from 80 to 90 per cent for the President.

"Detroit has experienced the largest measure of recovery of any city in the country," the red-haired former Mayor of Detroit said. "Flint and other industrial cities are not unlike Detroit in their political reaction."

Gov. Richard Leche of Louisiana, head of the late Huey P. Long's political organization in that state, informed Farley that Louisiana "would go down the line" for the President. He said that Gerald L. K. Smith, supporter of third party candidate, William Lemke, would play a small part in the election in Louisiana.

FOUR KILLED IN ACCIDENTS WITHIN STATE

Electric Shock, Auto Crash,
Bursting Emery Wheel,
Diving Take Toll.

Accidental contact with an electric line carrying 7000 volts killed Edison Clark, 22, Lyons, as he was helping install a booster electric station.

Mrs. Mary Baugh, 78, Bloomington, died in a Bloomington hospital of injuries suffered when an automobile driven by her husband, Curtis, was struck by a car driven by Dr. H. J. Pierson, Terre Haute.

Robert Anson Murphy, 47-year-old Greenfield blacksmith, died instantly when an emery wheel on which he was sharpening a hatchet

broke and a fragment of stone pierced his chest.

At Plymouth, Matthew Pieper, 17, died of a broken neck received when he dived into the shallow waters of Koons Lake. He was one of a group from Ulrich Orphan's Home in Chicago spending a vacation at a lake camp.

He is believed to have been mentally unbalanced. Passengers said he threw off his suitcase before leaping. Identification was established by a card in his purse.

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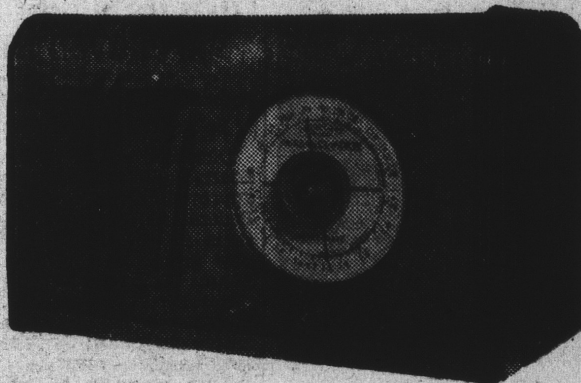
