Catholic Laymen of U. S.
to Convene on Campus
at South Bend.

NOTRE DAME, Ind., July 24.—Catholic laymen from every section of the United States are to convene at the University of Notre Dame Aug. 6 to 9 to take part in the eighteenth annual laymen's retreat.

The three-day retreat is to be directed by the Rev. Patrick Dolan, C. S. C., assisted by the Rev. John DeLaney, C. S. C., the Rev. Frederick Schulte, C. S. C., and the Rev. William McGuire, C. S. C.

All conference during the retreat will be held on the campus at The Grotto of Lourdes, a replica of the French shrine made famous by the miraculous cures said to be effected there.

In addition to the religious ceremonies Father Bolger is scheduled to deliver a series of talks on the moral aspects of present-day economic problems. Father Bolger is ranked as one of the outstanding Catholic economists in the United States.
