

# STREET PARADE TO BE STAGED BY FAIR BOARD

City Safety Board Approves Celebration Plans for Sept. 5.

A street parade Saturday, Sept. 5, was approved by the Safety Board today on the petition of the Indiana State Fair Commission. Merchants and state and city governmental departments are to have entries in the parade, to be held at 10:30 a. m., fair officials said.

The board also approved plans for a new fire station and ordered installation of traffic signals at two intersections.

William E. Liebold, assistant public safety director, appeared before the board to ask permission for the fair parade. He announced that prizes would be awarded for the best and the worst entries.

Phil Baker, radio comedian, is to appear as the star of a show in front of the state fair grand stand, Saturday night, Sept. 5, according to fair officials, in a program over a national radio network.

The new fire station 2 is to be built on the point at Roosevelt-av., Arrow-av and 16th-st. It is to be a modernistic, one-story building, 70 by 45 feet.

**Consider Police Station**

Chief Morrissey, who recently asked four police substations in the city, asked the board if it would be possible to locate one at this site. Board members agreed there was room on the city-owned ground for the substation and agreed to use the site providing Chief Morrissey's budget request is granted.

The board ordered installation of traffic signals at 38th and Illinois-av. and at Southeastern and English-av.

The lights at 38th and Illinois-av. are to be synchronized with other traffic lights along 38th-st., board officials said.

The board made permanent today the temporary appointment of George R. Popp as city building commissioner. Mr. Popp had been acting building commissioner.

# 17 NUDISTS ARRESTED AT HAMMOND BEACH

Police Raid Camp After Residents Complain of Conduct.

HAMMOND, Ind., July 28.—Seventeen members of a nudist camp at Edison Beach on the Hammond lake front were arrested today by city police on complaints of residents of the area.

All except Prof. K. S. Marlow, 60-year-old Chicago French instructor, and Anton Sweig, also of Chicago, were released after being hustled to police headquarters.

Authorities said Marlow and Sweig were leaders of the group.

Police investigated after a report that the nudists were romping unclad in view of spectators.

# DRIVER FACES CHARGE OF MANSLAUGHTER

Local Negro Held for Grand Jury After Fatal Crash.

William S. Overton, 36, Negro, of 1143 Roach-st., today was held for the Marion County grand jury on a charge of involuntary manslaughter by Judge Dewey Myers in Municipal Court.

Overton was arrested following an automobile accident on May 10 in which his car struck one driven by Herschel Robbins, 34, of Roachdale, at 16th and Hardings-av. Mr. Robbins' wife, Lois, was injured fatally.

# 37 FAMILIES FLEE GAS-FILLED ROOMS

North Side Apartment Residents Get Taste of War Conditions.

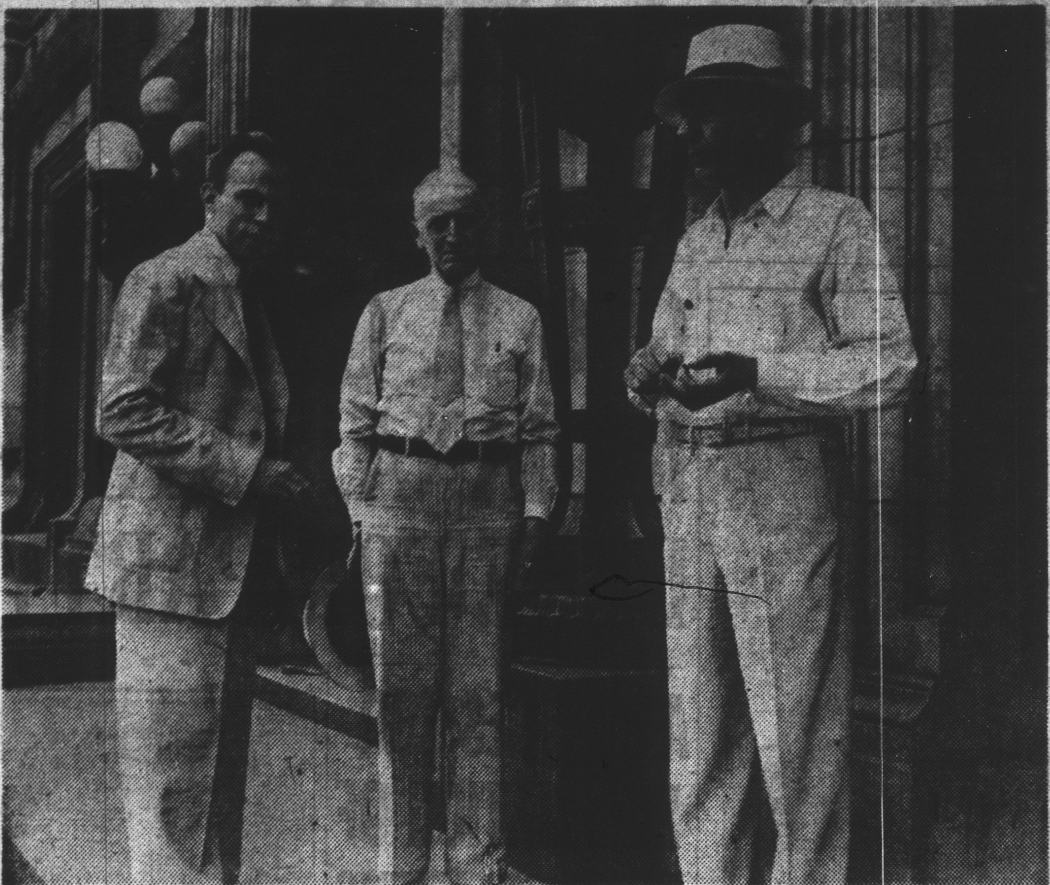

# CO-ED'S CRIES HEARD, REPORT

Occupant of Adjoining Room Tells of Moans During Night of Murder.

ASHEVILLE, N. C., July 28.—Helen Clevenger pleaded piteously for her life just before she was

criminally assaulted and shot to death in a hotel room here 12 days ago, Sheriff Laurence Brown was informed today.

Mrs. M. M. Cowdin, who occupied a room adjoining the 19-year-old New York University student on July 16, told a reporter of hearing the plea and anguished moans, Sheriff Brown was informed.

The report was telephoned Sheriff Brown by a Boston newspaper, which said its reporter interviewed Mrs. Cowdin at a Maine resort. She was said to be recuperating there from the shock of her experience.

Mr. Brown said he had asked a Maine sheriff, whose name he did not reveal, to investigate the report. Except for a bank accountant, who

thought he heard screams in the room about 1 a. m. the morning Miss Clevenger was slain, Mrs. Cowdin is the first to report hearing anything unusual.

Adding to the baffling mystery surrounding the case was the statement of a Negro chambermaid, Evelyn Moss, that Miss Clevenger's door was locked from the inside at 8:20 a. m.

# OVERPAYMENTS BY 4 TRUSTEES ARE REPORTED

Advisory Boards Received Too Much, Belief of Accountants.

Four Marion County township trustees are involved in difficulties because of alleged overpayments to their advisory boards, William P. Cosgrove, State Board of Accounts chief examiner, stated today.

Alleged overpayments amounting to \$158 in each case were said to have been made by Leonard Hohlt, Perry township trustee; Charles M. Dawson, Washington township trustee; Herbert McClelland, Wayne township trustee, and Charles M. Walker, Warren township trustee, Mr. Cosgrove said.

Members of advisory boards are now entitled to only \$5 a year, Mr. Cosgrove explained, whereas up to June 10, 1935, when they were relieved of poor fund duties, they received \$100 a year each. The four trustees are said to have continued to pay them at a higher rate. Mr. Cosgrove said it may be necessary to institute a test suit to recover the money from the trustees.

Mr. Hohlt today informed Mr. Cosgrove by letter that he would be "glad to see the matter properly adjusted" and claimed that he had

not been notified of the change in pay.

Mr. Cosgrove said the state board did not contemplate any action now to recover the money, but would wait to see what steps the trustees took.

# PARTY IS TO LAUNCH ELECTION CAMPAIGN

Socialist Labor Organizer to Speak to Local Groups Tomorrow.

The Socialist Labor Party in Indiana is to open its local campaign for the national election tomorrow when Sherman Haegquist of Illinois addresses labor and Socialist groups here. Mr. Haegquist is a party organizer.

# FOREST FIRE FLARES AGAIN AT WINAMAC

Tech High School Students Wire Parents Here of Change in Plans.

When Everett and Paul Dye, Tech High School students, set out June 23 for New Orleans in a canoe, they told their mother they would go to Houston, Tex., thence to Phoenix, Ariz., where they were to enter the University of Arizona.

Today, after having paddled 1900 miles to New Orleans and selling their equipment, they had com-

pleted the first leg of what they wired their father as, "our own royal road to romance." They had gone to Panama by plane.

James A. Dye, 2842 E. New York-st., the father, said that he had a hunch the boys had from the beginning planned to circle the globe. "They used to read every book on world traveling they could find," Mr. Dye said. "They studied every book by Richard Halliburton, and although they didn't tell me, I was sure they had bigger ideas than going to the University of Arizona this fall."

Mr. Dye said the boys, who are 19 and 20 years old, flew to Panama yesterday. He had no idea where they would go from there.
