However, even a good firm cucumber may have a spongy layer under the green skin. The rule, therefore, is to peel thickly, in contrast to other vegetables.

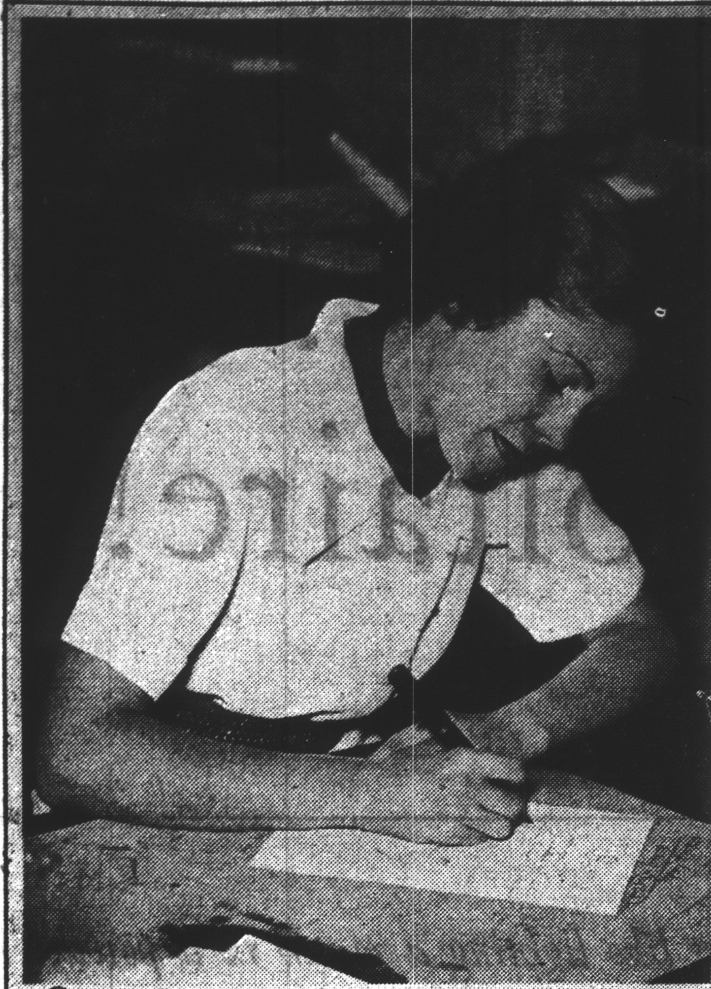
VOGUE IS STARTED

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Wife of Norman Thomas Says She's Too Busy for Career

NEW YORK, Aug. 3.—Mrs. Norman Thomas will tell you she hasn't a career and never even thought of such a thing.

She's much too busy. For she combines being (1) the wife of the Socialist candidate for President; (2) secretary to the Socialist candidate for President; (3) a housewife, superintending the management of two homes; (4) the mother of five children and grandmother of one (she's very proud of this); and (5) a professional breeder of blue-blooded dogs.

But a career—no, indeed!

"I never think of my time as my own," Mrs. Thomas explains. "Small, smiling and friendly, she's a familiar figure at campaign meetings, sitting unobtrusively in a corner. She wouldn't miss them for anything. They're 'interesting,' and besides it's a time-saver to attend—her husband doesn't need to bother telling her what happened."

Types Speeches

She always listens to his speeches, knows every word of them because she types them—taking dictation by the "hunt and peck" system on a portable typewriter.

"I used to think it was very clever of me," she admits, "to be able to take down speeches while we were driving from town to town on campaign trips. Then I decided perhaps it was cleverer of my husband to be able to dictate, driving the car."

The chief value of the wife-secretary arrangement, as she sees it, is being able to work at any and all hours. This saves time and "it helps to get ideas down when they come to you."

For the campaign period, a part-time professional secretary has been assisting in the Thomas household.

"It's the ambition of my life," Mrs. Thomas confides, "to make my typewriter sound like hers."

Wanted to Be Nurse

Born on Staten Island half a century ago, Mrs. Thomas grew up to lead a conventional life prescribed for a young lady early in the 1900's. Still in her teens, though, she became interested in social welfare and wanted to become a nurse.

Her family frowned on this. Instead, she enrolled for volunteer work in a tuberculosis clinic under the auspices of Christ Church, of which young Norman Thomas was assistant pastor.

"He helped me with some of the disciplinary cases," she explains. "Three years after they met they were married. As a pastor's wife, Mrs. Thomas continued her interest in nursing, found it useful in making acquaintances with families in the parish."

When Mr. Thomas gave up his

ministry for the field of economic reform, she again assumed the role of his devoted aide.

Raises Spaniels at Farm

At the Thomas' four-acre "farm" near Cold Spring Harbor on Long Island there are cows, chickens and kennels for her blue-blooded cocker spaniels. The three oldest children, who are married, take turns living there during the summer and, when their mother is away, take care of the spaniels as well as orders for milk, butter and eggs.

Cocker spaniels are her favorites. One, Beau Jest, was a champion. She always shows the dogs herself in the prize ring, has never employed a professional handler.

People are always coming and going at the Thomas home in New York and on the farm.

"It's more pleasant for me to keep open house" for committees and meetings," Mrs. Thomas says, "than to entertain." She never gives parties, but lends her home frequently for Socialist functions.
