

## HEED WARNING SIGNS, HIGHWAY OFFICIAL URGES

Disregard of Instructions  
Greatest Cause of  
Crashes, Belief.

Disregard of caution and warning signs maintained by the State Highway Commission is a frequent cause of accidents, James D. Adams, commission chairman, pointed out today in a plea for motorists to observe the purpose of the signs.

Failure to heed "stop" signs placed at intersections is one of the most frequent accident causes, the chairman said.

"Installation and maintenance of caution and direction signs on the state highway system costs several thousand dollars a year," Mr. Adams declared, "but it is a sound investment in motorists' safety if drivers observe the warnings."

New signs reflectorized for greater visibility at night have replaced many old signs during the past year, Mr. Adams said.

Signs and markers on Indiana highways conform to standards prescribed by the American Association of State Highway Officials, which advocates use of standard caution and direction signs in all states.

Use of standard signs and markings eliminates confusion and a chance of accident for motorists from other states, the chairman declared.

## POWERFUL POLICE GUN IS DEVELOPED

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20. — A new revolver, more than twice as powerful as the standard police service revolver and firing with sufficient force to demolish an automobile engine block, soon will be placed on the market commercially, it was learned today.

Withheld from commercial production until recently because of efforts of law-enforcement agencies to have it kept off the markets, the new revolver shoots a special .375 caliber shell so heavy it would blow an ordinary revolver to bits. Cost of the new gun will be approximately \$60, nearly twice that of ordinary revolvers. Officials be-

lieve only a few police departments can afford to purchase ample quantities of the weapons. The Administration, fearing widespread underworld use of the new weapon, may ask Congress to regulate sale of the revolvers under a licensing system regulating the sale of machine guns.

The new gun weighs more than 44 ounces. The impact of its bullet imparts a "smashing force" of more than 800 pounds—twice the force exerted in an ordinary service revolver.

## ORDER BALLOTS FOR 2,250,000 HOOSIER VOTERS

Election Commissioners Are  
Guided by New Law  
This Fall.

The State Board of Election Commissioners announced today that 6,750,000 ballots have been ordered printed for the three separate votes to be cast in the general fall election.

Parke Beadle, election board clerk, said the board had agreed that 2,250,000 presidential elector ballots would be required and an equal number for the state ticket and a constitutional amendment vote.

The Presidential ballot is to be printed on cherry red paper, the state ballot on pink and the amendment ballot on white, Mr. Beadle said.

**New Law in Effect**  
The November election will be the first general election in Indiana since the 1933 act, calling for separate ballots for presidential elector and state ticket voting, went into effect.

Mr. Beadle said the state election laws are now being printed and will be available within the next three weeks.

Circuit Court clerks of Indiana's 92 counties will be required to make two trips to the Statehouse for ballots this fall because of the new absentee voters law, Mr. Beadle said. They must first call for the absentee ballots, sign receipts for them, and return later for the regular


ballots unless they wish to sign receipts for them also on the first trip. Because of the separate balloting this year an additional ballot box will be provided in each of the 400 precincts of the state.
