

## 4-H CLUB GIRLS' SCHOOL BEGINS AT FAIRGROUND

163 Enrollees to Receive Training in Home Economics.

The Indiana State Fair Girls' School opened today at the Fairground with 163 girls representing 84 counties enrolled. All enrollees won trips to the school by achieving high awards in 4-H Club work.

Although there are social affairs, sight-seeing trips and amusements provided for the girls, the purpose of the school is to provide training in home economics, staff members explained.

Each county in the state is entitled to two representatives to the school, which lasts for two weeks. The tuition fee is defrayed by an organization or institution or by interested individuals.

The girls are divided into six groups, with an honor girl at the head of each. These honor girls, who attended the school last year, were selected on the basis of attitude, scholarship and leadership. Mrs. Calvin Perdue, camp director, said.

### Honor Girls Named

They are Edith Smith, Tipton County; Smith Martin, Fountain County; Margaret Hoover, Newton County; Mary Richards, Posey County; Nellie Swank, Orange County, and Shirley Osmon, Daviess County.

The school has seven departments: Preparation and serving of meals, dish washing, laundry work, dormitory, recreation, handicrafts and training in home nursing and first aid.

Through co-operation of state institutions of higher learning and interested individuals, the Indiana Board of Agriculture offers several scholarships to girls outstanding in the schools.

## TROTZKY FLAYS STALIN REGIME

People Robbed of Fruits of Revolution, Charges Deposed Leader.

OSLO, Norway, Aug. 28.—Josef Stalin, Soviet Russia's "iron man," has robbed the Russian people of the fruits of the 1917 revolution and is subjecting them to a "privileged caste," Leon Trotsky charged today.

As a result, Trotsky predicted that the Soviet Union ultimately must endure another revolution to secure the freedom of the working classes.

An exile here, under oath to take no part in politics, Trotsky was interviewed by telephone.

Trotzky, recently accused by the Stalin group of plotting with 16 men to overthrow the Soviet regime and kill its leaders, was bitter in his denunciation. He has denied all part in the alleged "plot" for which the 16 were executed.

The bearded exile summed up the situation in Moscow thus:

"Stalin, the bureaucrat, has killed the Bolshevik Party, thus robbing the people of the fruits of the October Revolution."




