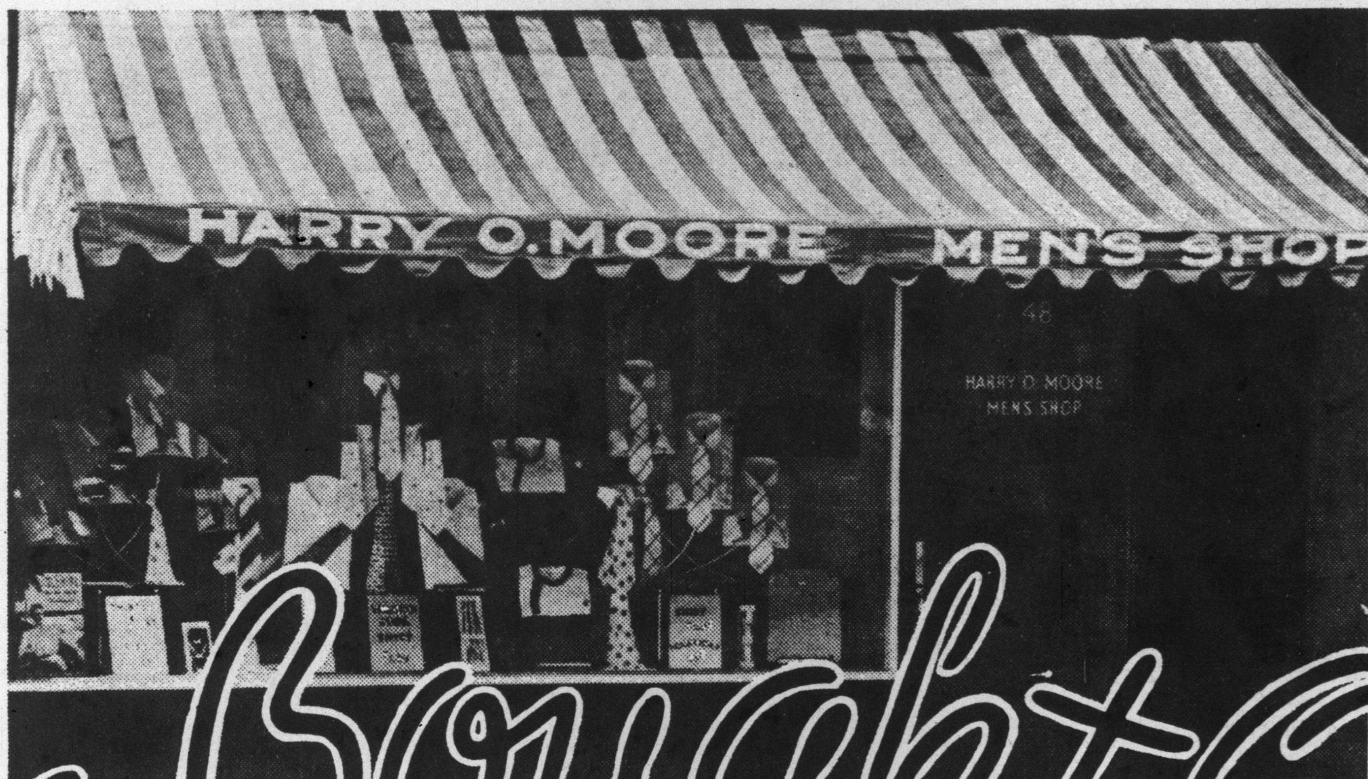
From more than 800 entries, he selected about 100 pieces to win prize money which totals \$4,250.50. He said he was pleased especially with water color work.
