

## JACOB FELGER, CIVIL WAR HERO, IS DEAD AT 97

Veteran Last Survivor of Indiana Battery; Served Under Sherman.

JACOB F. FELGER, last survivor of the Eleventh Indiana Battery in the Civil War, died yesterday at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Benjamin F. Saunders, 701 N. Bradley-st., after an illness of several years. He was 97.

Funeral services and burial are to be in Fort Wayne Monday.

Mr. Felger was born in Wittenberg, Germany, and came to this country at the age of nine. His family settled on a farm in Lake Township, near Arcola.

At 22, when the Civil War began, he enlisted with volunteers from Fort Wayne in the Eleventh Indiana Battery under Capt. Arnold Stuebel and Gen. William Tecumseh Sherman.

Among the engagements in which he took part were the siege of Corinth, the battles of Chickasaw, Nashville, Mission Ridge, Tullahoma, Lookout Mountain, Tunnel Hill and Buzzard's Roost.

At the close of the war he returned to the Lake Township farm and remained there until 1904 when he moved to Fort Wayne. He came to the home of his daughter following the death of his wife in 1925. He was a member of the St. Mathew Lutheran Church.

Survivors, besides Mrs. Somers, are two other daughters, Mrs. Etta Parnin and Mrs. Laura Rhodenbaugh, both of Fort Wayne; five sons, Ernest H. Felger, Walter H. Felger and Albert G. Felger, all of Fort Wayne; William H. Felger of Milwaukee and Rev. J. C. Felger of Victoria, Tex.; 26 grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren.

JAMES F. POWERS, 209 N. State-av., who died Wednesday, is to be buried in Holy Cross Cemetery tomorrow following funeral services in the home at 9 a. m. He was 72.

Mr. Powers, who was born in Indianapolis, and lived here all of his life, was district freight and passenger agent for the Chicago, Rock Island & Pacific Railway for 34 years. He retired two years ago. He was a member of the Elks, Knights of Columbus and Holy Cross Catholic Church.

Survivors are the widow, a daughter, Mrs. Margaret Ball, and a granddaughter.

HARVEY J. WRAY, 312 N. Pine-st., who died Wednesday in City Hospital of complications resulting from a hip fracture received in a fall June 29, is to be buried in Crown Hill Cemetery tomorrow following funeral services in the home at 9 a. m. He was 67.

Mr. Wray, born in Cumberland, had lived in Indianapolis many years, serving as railroad crossing watchman. A sister, Mrs. Charles G. Unversaw of Indianapolis, survives him.

## CANDIDATES FOR GOVERNOR LIST SPEAKING DATES

Both Townsend, Springer Scheduled to Speak at Sunman Sept. 19.

Both major party candidates for Governor were scheduled for addresses at Sunman, a Ripley County village of less than 400 population, Sept. 19, in itineraries announced today at their respective headquarters.

Lieut. Gov. M. Clifford Townsend, Democratic nominee, is to talk in the afternoon and Raymond S. Springer, Republican candidate, at night. Mr. Townsend's night address is set for Rising Sun, only 25 miles distant.

Mr. Springer will open the week with a four-day series of meetings

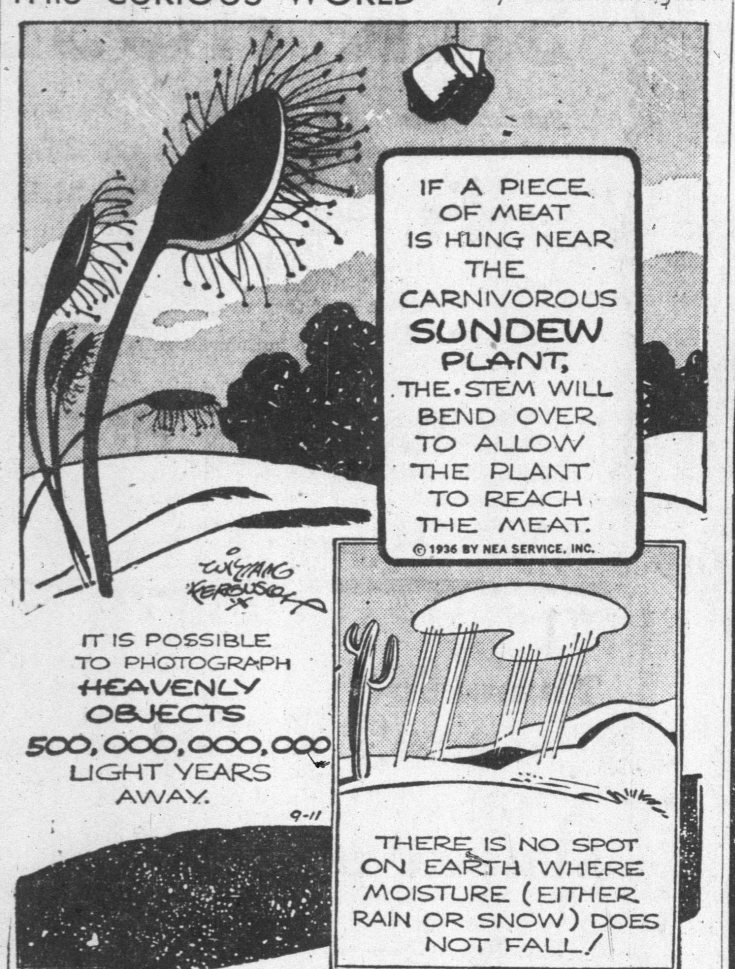
in Lake County, Monday through Thursday. He is scheduled to speak at Greencastle Friday on his route to the Ripley County meeting.

Mr. Townsend will open the week in the northwestern section, speaking at a Noble-Whitley County rally at Kendallville Monday night.

A Fourth District rally at Port Wayne is on his schedule Tuesday night and he is to speak at Winchester Wednesday night.

Continuing to the south, he will talk at Liberty in the afternoon and Newcastle at night on Thursday. Three speeches at Brownstown and Nashville in the afternoon and at Madison at night, are on his schedule for Friday before going to Sunman.
