LIFTS QUARANTINE ON VEGETABLE SHIPPING

WASHINGTON, Sept. 25.—Secretary of Agriculture Henry A. Wallace today removed for the season restrictions on interstate movement of fruits and vegetables under the Japanese beetle quarantine regulations which applied to states along the North Atlantic seaboard.

Restrictions on cut flowers, however, remain effective until Oct. 15. Remaining in force throughout the year are restrictions on the movement of nursery, ornamental and greenhouse stock and all other plants except cut flowers and portions of plants without root and free from soil.

The United States ambassador arrived here last night on a visit. One of the most distinguished members in the United States diplomatic service, he was minister to Denmark and Switzerland, and ambassador to Turkey, before assuming his far eastern post in 1932.

START MAILING CHECKS SOON

AAA to Begin Payment of Farm Benefits Early Next Month.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 25.—The flow of farm benefit checks will begin early in October with between 2 and 5 per cent of the 6,000,000 persons expected to participate in the soil conservation program being paid by Nov. 1, H. R. Tolley, AAA administrator, said today.

Although the peak of the payments will not be reached until December, some will be made next month as a result of appeals from drought states.

"We have had many appeals, especially from the drought states, to expedite the payments and we are going to do everything we can to see that they are promptly paid," Tolley said. "We hope to be able to get somewhere between 2 and 5 per cent of the payments out next month."

This may mean that from 120,000 to 300,000 checks will be mailed to farmers before the election, AAA spokesmen said, however, that the percentage of checks to be sent before Nov. 1 would be smaller this year than sent before that date in other years of AAA programs.

ENGRAVING FIRM ENLARGES PLANT

The Circle Engraving Co. is to occupy the entire second floor at 151 E. Maryland-st. when remodeling is completed, according to Gerald Power, manager of the business rentals department of the Fletcher Trust Co.

A five-year lease involving approximately \$12,000 for the 7000 square feet of floor space has been signed. Expansion of the engraving plant necessitated more space, company officials said.

Incorporators of the Circle Engraving Co. include Cecil Syam, Hugh Grohan, Gordon Mess, "Booby" Brooker, Alvin Golay and George Mess. Established in 1932, the company produces color box plates and engravings used by packagers, food manufacturers throughout the Middle West. Company pay rolls are expected to reach \$100,000 this year.
