


Indianapolis Marks Anniversary of James Whitcomb Riley's Birth

SWALLOWED TACK IS FATAL TO BABY

FORT WAYNE, Ind., Oct. 7.—Death ended 7-month-old David Richardson's suffering yesterday after a number of operations failed to extract a tack lodged in his

throat. He died at Temple Hospital in Philadelphia.

His parents rushed him East Aug. 31 after two unsuccessful operations in Indianapolis. At that time an incision had to be made in the throat and a tube inserted to permit breathing. Several more operations were performed in Philadelphia, all without success.
