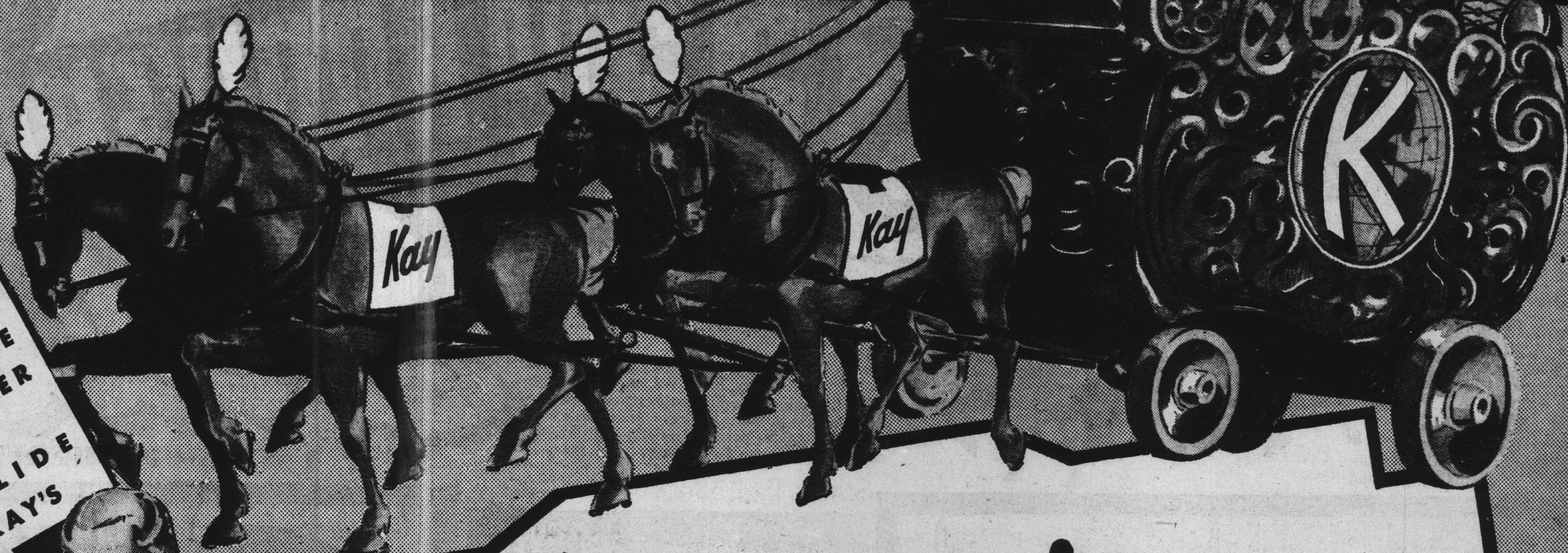
### CROSSES TO MARK AUTO DEATH SCENES
